On the Day's News

ALL the war news in the next few weeks won't come from Europe. A considerable share of it will come from Washington, where opposing forces are marshaling for an epochal battle.

SENATOR ROBINSON, Democratic leader in the senate, is dead. When a leader dies, a NEW LEADER must be chosen.

Democrats of a more conservative turn (and the South is essentially conservative) want someone who won't be a rubber stamp for the New Deal. They seem to be lining up behind Senator Byrnes, of South Carolina, and Senator Harrison, of Mississippi.

NOTE: If you are interested in the fight, that Senator Byrnes promptly withdraws, stating flatly on Friday that he will not be a candidate. His candidacy would have DIVIDED the conservatives. Apparently he doesn't want the conservatives divided.

FLASHES OF OREGON EVENTS

Picketing at Issue
THE DAILES, July 21 (AP)—The newly formed grocery clerks' union sought a court test of the city ordinance prohibiting picketing, assigning pickets to a grocery store operated by R. J. Wilson for asserted refusal to observe closing hours prescribed by the union. Officers said they would take no action pending an opinion by the city attorney on the validity of the ordinance, passed several years ago.

NORTH CHINA ARMY FEARS TO WITHDRAW

Japs Also Agree to Leave but Hold Battle Lines; Americans Prepare for Defense.

TIENSIN, July 21 (AP)—North China's 29th army withdrew the majority of her troops today from the Wanghsien battle zone, 19 miles west of Peiping, under the menacing guns and watchful guard of Japanese infantry.

Some Chinese believed the Japanese would move into the demilitarized zone and take control of the Peiping-Hankow railroad.

Chinese feared the extensive preparations pressed direct attack against the walled city of Peiping.

ENGLAND DENIES NAZI BOAT HALTED

LONDON, July 21 (AP)—The British admiralty announced today that a practice charge dropped by the destroyer Wolfhound to signal a British submarine off Portland, while a German U-boat possessed nearby, led to erroneous reports the German boat had been halted.

ROSWELL, Okla., July 21 (AP)—Fred Tindol, escaped Texas convict, was shot to death and his companion, Pete Traxler, Oklahoma outlaw, was wounded seriously today by two farmers they were holding as hostages.

DICK VANDEVERT OF DRAIN PASSES ON

Dick Vandevent, 72, died at Mercy Hospital, Roseburg, this morning after a long illness. He was born in Canada (Grove, Oregon, April 18, 1865, where he lived for several years. He had been a resident of this county for the past 25 years, living from 1919 to 1929 at Yoncalla, where he was engaged in farming. He was married to Miss Lottie M. Hobbs at Portland in 1909.

MISSING YOUTH'S ARREST ORDERED

A warrant for the arrest of Malcolm Fleming, 19, service station operator missing from Portland, has been issued by the Federal bureau of investigation. It was reported today, a correspondent automobile which disappeared with Fleming early Monday was recovered yesterday in Roseburg. State police reported that a youth answering Fleming's description had purchased a bus ticket at Roseburg for Los Angeles. It was at first believed the attendant was kidnapping during a robbery of the station. Between \$20 and \$30 was missing from the station funds.

CLOSED SHOP CONTRACT HELD OUTSIDE LAW

NEWARK, N. J., July 21 (AP)—Labor contracts providing for closed shops fell under a chancery court ban today as "illegal and unenforceable." Strikers to accomplish closed shops were condemned as "unlawful" in the same ruling by Vice Chancellor Berry.

"It seems strange that at this late day it should be necessary to repeat that a strike which has for its object the 'closed shop' is illegal and unenforceable. The object of the strike being unlawful, all acts in support thereof, including picketing, are also unlawful."

High Court Quoted
The vice chancellor quoted the following from a U. S. supreme court decision, handed down in 1932, to indicate the change taking place in labor relations:

CHICAGO, July 21 (AP)—A speeding roller coaster train hurtled down a steep incline into a car of an uncontrolled train at R.C. side amusement park last night, injured 24 of the terror-stricken riders, three of them seriously.

SALEM, July 21 (AP)—The state department of agriculture today called a hearing at Milton July 29 when representatives of the prune industry will discuss whether they want to retain the standard 30-pound prune container or use a 35-pound one.

ONE-VOTE MARGIN ELECTS BARKLEY SENATE LEADER TO SUCCEED JOSEPH ROBINSON

WASHINGTON, July 21 (AP)—Senator Alben W. Barkley of Kentucky, won the democratic leadership of the senate today in a close contest.

Both senators have supported the Roosevelt administration on nearly every issue, including court reorganization.

President Roosevelt publicly kept his hands off the contest. Both candidates participated in a legislative conference with him last night.



Senator Harrison, following Barkley on the radio, said he had just congratulated the victor and that "we are all going to work for harmony in the democratic party."

LOWER BENCH ONLY BODY TO BE INVOLVED

Wheeler, Opposition Chief, Says No Enlargement of U. S. Supreme Court to Be Allowed.

WASHINGTON, July 21 (AP)—Senator Wheeler (D., Mont.), after a conference with Vice-President Garner today, said opponents of the Roosevelt court bill would draft a compromise dealing only with the lower courts, and submit it to the administration. Supreme court enlargement would not be involved.

Wheeler's statement was the first hint that the foes of the bill would submit an alternative for the presidential program.

FRESH CAMPAIGN SET BY TOWNSEND

CHICAGO, July 21 (AP)—Teasing his three-year-old pension movement "far from dead," Dr. Francis E. Townsend disclosed today an impending legislative campaign in the states.

TACOMA, Wash., July 21 (AP)—John L. Lewis extended a welcoming hand to 100,000 new CIO members today, while the newly organized International Woodworkers of America, in convention here, argued enthusiastically about details of organization and plans for expansion.

CAULIFLOWER PACT TO RULE SHIPPING

WASHINGTON, July 21 (AP)—A marketing agreement to regulate shipments of cauliflower grown in Oregon, the agricultural department administration said, will be placed in effect July 23.

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
