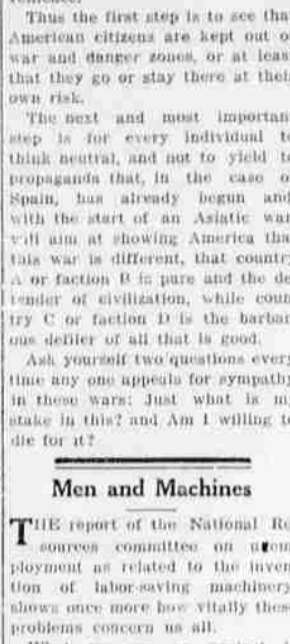
PASSENGERS ON PULLMAN ROBBED

NEWLYWEDS IN CRASH PASS CRISIS

CORVALLIS, Ore., July 26.—(AP)—B. L. McCune, city clerk of Colusa, Calif., and his bride, who were seriously injured last week when their automobile plunged down a 75-foot embankment on the Oregon coast highway, apparently had successfully passed a crisis today.

Attending physicians at Waldport, where the couple is in a hospital, said they had recovered from the shock of the accident and anticipated to be on the way to recovery if complications do not develop. Relatives from California arrived Saturday.

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DEATH CAR DRIVER FACING CHARGES

KLAMATH FALLS, July 26.—(AP)—Charges of involuntary manslaughter were filed here this afternoon against Ralph Peyton, 22, in connection with Saturday's automobile accident on the Lakeview highway in which Dewey Byrne, 49, and Mildred Hicks, 43, were killed.

Peyton was driving the car in which Byrne, long-time superintendent for the Ewauna Box company, was riding. The car collided with another driven by Mrs. May Hicks, in which Mildred was a passenger. Viola Hicks, 43, is in a critical condition as a result of the mishap.

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Chicago Hospital Develops New Treatment for Acid Stomach Ulcers and Colitis

Chicago, July 26.—(AP)—A revolutionary new drug treatment for ulcers of the stomach and duodenum, and colitis, has been developed by a team of physicians at the Chicago Hospital for Digestive Diseases.

The new treatment, which is based on the use of a powerful antacid, has been found to be effective in the treatment of these conditions. It is expected that this new treatment will be widely used in the near future.

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CCC DROPS RELIEF QUALIFICATIONS

All relief qualifications connected with enrollment in the civilian conservation corps have been removed, Franklin Voigt, executive secretary of the Douglas county relief committee, was informed today from state headquarters. Hereafter it has been necessary for young men to be from families on the relief roll before they could enlist in the CCC.

Under the new ruling enrollment is open to all young men between 17 and 23 years of age. It is not necessary that the enrollee have dependents, nor that he make an allotment from his monthly pay to any other member of his family. The enrollment period closes July 31 and all young men interested in joining the organization are urged to immediately contact the county relief headquarters.

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
