1 tablespoon flour
3 eggs
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1/2 teaspoon salt

Beat pineapple juice in double boiler. Beat eggs, sugar, flour and salt, until light and fluffy. Pour into hot pineapple juice and cook until thick. Add lemon juice and remove from heat. Chill.

When ready to serve the salad fold in an equal part of whipped cream.

FRUIT POCKETS

MRS. JOHN CLAYPOOL
Roseburg, Ore.

Filling: 8 or 10 apples; 1 c. sugar; 1 lb. almonds (or less); 1/2 t. vanilla; 1/2 t. nutmeg. Slice apples on vegetable slicer (or chop very fine). Add sugar, place in covered bowl. Let stand over night, strain off part of juice. Blanch almonds and grind together with walnuts. Mix with apples, add vanilla and nutmeg. Add sugar. Do not allow this mixture to be too soft.

Dough: 4 eggs; 4 T. sugar; 3 c. flour; 1/2 lb. butter; 1 T. shortening; 1 t. nutmeg; 1 T. baking powder; 1 t. salt; 1 t. vanilla; 1 t. lemon extract or the grated rind of 1 lemon. Beat eggs slightly and add sugar. Sift flour, baking powder, salt and nutmeg. Melt fat slowly. Add the fat to the eggs and sugar. Beat 10 min. Add the dry ingredients. Add more flour if necessary so the dough can be rolled. Roll out the dough to about 1/8 in. thick. Cut out dough with large size cookie cutter, put 1 t. filling on the dough. Turn dough over so it will cover the filling, press edges together with fork. Bake in medium oven for about 15 min. Sprinkle with powdered sugar.

Variation: Fried Pie (Southern Dish): Use cooked dried fruit (peaches or apricots). Fold in dough as above. Fry in skillet a nice brown. Serve with syrup. Biscuit dough may be used—L. Morgan, Roseburg.

Another syrup to pour over Apple Rolls while cooking is made with 4 c. water, 3 c. sugar, 4 T. cinnamon candy.

2 c. flour; 4 t. baking powder; 1/2 t. salt; 1/4 t. T. sugar; 1/2 c. shortening; 1/2 c. milk (2 eggs if desired). Mix and sift the dry ingredients and work in the shortening with the fingers or a knife. Gradually add the milk (if eggs are used, beat in mixing cup, add enough liquid to make 3/4 cup), making a soft dough on to a floured board and roll to 1/8 in. thickness. Bake in sheets with a large cutter for individual shortcakes. Bake in a hot oven for 12 min. When done, split into two parts. Butter and top sweetened fruit between the layers and on top. Serve hot with cream or top with following: Whip 2 eggs whites; add 2 T. sugar and
