CARSON RE-STATES BONNEVILLE VIEWS

PORTLAND, July 29. (AP)—Replying to a lengthy letter from J. D. Ross, Mayor Joseph K. Carson reiterated his objection to blanket power rates for Bonneville and his opposition to the possible appointment of Ross as administrator.

Ross had written to reply to questions previously addressed to him by Carson.

The mayor agreed with the former superintendent of the Seattle municipal power system on the desirability of the lowest possible rates of tying up the project with Grand Coulee and predicated the basic power rate on the cost of the ultimate development, but protested the lagging in transmission costs.

"I know that for small users of power the question of distribution plays a large part in the cost," Carson wrote. "But as to basic rates, there is no question of expensive distribution does not enter, the basic rate is all important."

"It is certain that no discrimination should be made against anyone on account of distance or lack of it, but to add to the cost of power delivered at remote points the cost of transmission is not discrimination. It is only sound economics."

He referred to a report made by Ross in 1934 to the city administration of Seattle, which ascribed the resulting in the loss to western Washington of its entire hinterland to Portland and lower Columbia cities.

"I do not believe you can blame me," he wrote, "for wanting to know whether or not one who is to be administrator is antagonistic to the interests of Portland and the lower Columbia river."

3RD SOVIET PLANE TO DASH FOR U. S.

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, July 29. (AP)—Daylight around the clock and ideal weather conditions most of the way lay ahead of a projected third Soviet airplane dash to the United States from Moscow today to an unknown destination in America.

An American-trained pilot, Sigismund Levantitsky, known as the "Lander of Russia," was poised to take off at 5 a. m. P. S. T. with three to five other persons in a four-motored plane.

Levantitsky was posted to make Fairbanks a refueling stop, and then fly on possibly to Chicago or New York.

Fairbanks is about 3,500 miles from Moscow.

Leading Figures in Sino-Japanese Crisis Sketched for Followers of Chinese War

At the "front."
Lieut. General Kiyoshi Katsuki (Kee-Yoh-Shee Kah - Tau - Kee): Commander of Japan's North China garrison; 56 years old; considered one of half-dozen outstanding leaders of the Japanese army; noted for ability to combine diplomacy with strong will; named to command and restore discipline in the Imperial bodyguard vision in March, 1936, after part of that unit had been involved in the military uprising of February 26, 1936.

General Sung Chieh-Yuan (Sung Chay Yuan): Chairman of the Hopedai-Chahar political council and commander of the 29th army which constitutes the Chinese garrison of the Tientsin-Peking district; aged 52; a veteran of Chinese resistance to Japan's continental advance; fought the Japanese in Chahar in 1935; not only a political and military leader, but also his province; apparently made some deal with the Japanese military by which they permitted him to retain command of the 29th army and become head of the Hopedai-Chahar council, autonomous organ for administration of North China; a wily politician, he has been the buffer between the Japanese army and the central Chinese government; professes full allegiance to Nanking but still deals with the Japanese as an autonomous governor; for the past year has become more amenable to Nanking's supervision.

Prince Fumihito Konohe (Foom-Mah-Roh Koh-Noh-Keh): 46-year-old premier of Japan; comes from a family which antedates written Japanese history and for centuries supplied consorts for the emperors; fond of golf and proud of his son, Fumihito, Princeton golf team captain; has been bedridden through much of the present crisis.

General Chiang Kai-Shek (Cheung-Kigh-Shek): Leader of the Chinese army and chairman of the executive council—corresponding to premier—of the Chinese central government; strong man of China since 1926; has been fighting for more than ten years to unify China and build up a Chinese army to drive Japan from Chinese territory; thus far has avoided a frontal clash with Japan; enemies for this reason say he betrays his country to Japan; friends say he is following the only wise course, playing for time while making China over into a real military power.

Koki Hirota (Koh-Kee Hee-Roh Tah): The formulator, as foreign minister (1933-36), premier (1936-37) and now again as foreign minister, of Japan's present policies toward China, main planks of which are autonomy of North China, eradication of anti-Japanese collaboration against commun-

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OREGON'S BUYING POWER RANKS THIRD

PORTLAND, July 29. (AP)—A buying power index went a long way today to convince Oregonians their state is a pretty good place to live. It listed the average spendable income of Oregon residents as the third highest in the United States.

Breaking it down into counties, Klamath leads in buying power, with Multnomah in second place. The survey, compiled by an insurance company, said the Pacific coast excelled in living standards. The buying power index placed Nevada first and California second. Third place Oregon has an average of 135 compared with the national average of 100.

DEFROCKED VICAR MAULED BY LION

SKEGNESS, Eng., July 29. (AP)—Harold Davidson, defrocked vicar of Skegness, probably owed his life today to Rene Somer, a 16-year-old sidshow attendant who saved him from an enraged lion.

As it was the 65-year-old former vicar was dangerously injured. Davidson was delivering a speech yesterday from the lion's den as a sidshow attraction when the lion started mauling him. The girl noticed a whip and an iron rod and drove the animal back while she dragged Davidson from the cage. Then she fainted. (Davidson was defrocked in 1932 after a sensational trial before an Episcopal court on charges of immorality. He has earned his living since in sidshows.)

SOUTHERN OREGON SHIPPING CHROME

PORTLAND, July 30. (AP)—Four catloads of chrome ore from southern Oregon mines reached the waterfront yesterday to await shipment to eastern markets.

Philip H. Carroll, secretary for the commission of public docks, said other cars will arrive soon to make up a 500-ton cargo.

The ore came from Grants Pass where considerable chrome was mined during the war. Carroll said the full extent of the deposit was not definitely known but further developments may reveal it as one of the state's leading industries.
