MILK CODE UPHELD BY GOV. MARTIN

PORTLAND, Aug. 6.—(AP)—As a nation of milk drinkers the United States doesn't vary, being last among the 11 leading countries of the world, delegates to the annual convention of the National Association of Milk Control Boards heard G. A. Norris, president, assert here.

Speakers at the opening session stressed the importance of milk control as an interstate problem and the necessity of federal assistance to obtain price uniformity.

Governor Martin of Oregon praised the Oregon act as a means of increasing the returns to the producer and establishing stable supplies and standard grades.

Opposition to such legislation, he said, was "prompted either by ignorance of the facts or by selfish motives."

Howard G. Eiseman, chairman of the Pennsylvania commission, assailed "agitators" who would stir up public opinion in favor of lower prices to the consumer as "boothbait."

Governor Martin said it was his determination to see that regulation was confined to the control of milk as "in my opinion the farmer has enough trouble with the normal bacteria in his milk without the injection of politics into it."

TALK ON DIAMONDS GIVEN BY PASTOR

Diamonds—how they are mined, where they are found in the world, how they are prepared for market and why they are valuable—were the subject of an address given the Roseburg Rotary club yesterday by Rev. Linden Leavitt, who makes a hobby of studying gems. The speaker told of his experiences in various parts of the world in trading in diamonds. He also explained that the value of a diamond is not always determined by its weight. The way in which a stone is cut has the greatest bearing upon its sale price, he stated.

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"GIMME" ACTION OF DEMOCRATS RAPPED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Senator Wheeler (D-Mont.) denounced the democratic national committee today for soliciting campaign contributions from Robert R. Young, New York railway magnate.

Wheeler, chairman of the senate railroad investigating committee, said the solicitation was a "deplorable practice" and added: "It might give the impression that people had to give money in order to get proper treatment, or that they might get some kind of favor."

Young testified yesterday he bought \$15,000 worth of democratic national convention books early this spring, but that the solicitors had "positively never discussed" his dealings with federal agencies.

As today's hearing opened, Wheeler declared: "I resent the democratic committee going to people just prior to their coming here and soliciting funds."

"It reflects on the committee and every other branch of congress," Wheeler continued. "Some groups who denounce economic royalists are getting handouts from the very people they denounce."

He asserted that whether such matters were mentioned by the solicitors or not "there is always an inference" that special favors or concessions might be involved.

Wheeler then turned to Young's plans for merging Algherby and Chesapeake corporations, the chief holding companies in the huge Van Sweringen rail network which he controls.

APPLE ASSN.-UNION DISPUTE UNSETTLED

HOOD RIVER, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Week-long negotiations failed to bring an agreement between the apple growers association and the fruit, cannery and agricultural workers' union on new wage and hour schedules.

Association officials contended the scales proposed by the union would increase apple and pear prices 25 cents a box. The union denied the scale was excessive, asserting it was on a parity with that already accepted by other packing organizations.

PINCHOT OPPOSES FORESTRY TRANSFER

SPOKANE, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Gilford Pinchot, former governor of Pennsylvania and the first chief of the U. S. forest service, said in an interview here Secretary Ickes' plan to transfer the service to the interior department would endanger the whole benefits the west is deriving from forest resources.

"The national forests have been admirably handled by the agricultural department for 20 years," Pinchot said.

"Now Secretary Ickes proposes to transfer them to the interior department which has permitted the looting and devastation of almost every national resource of which it has had control."

"The interior department has done the worst harm than all the other departments of the government put together."

Pinchot said today that it would make no difference whether cities held the machines legal so they can tax them, explaining that this would not hold water in a court fight.

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NEWPORT, Ore., Aug. 6.—(AP)—Lincoln county will observe the 100th anniversary on August 29 of the long, hazardous journey made by Jason Lee and Cyrus Shepard from the Lee mission at Salem to the Pacific ocean.

The famed figures of the state's early period of settlement traveled with their wives over an old Indian trail, now the Salmon river highway.

The event will be held at Ocean Lake. The committee includes Dr. Bruce Baxter, president of Willamette university, the Rev. Mr. Galke, Tillamook; the Rev. A. M. Williams, Nelscott, and Leslie M. Scott of Portland.



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FATE OF PINBALL GAMES IN DOUBT

Oregon District Attorneys Indicate Little Aid to Abolishment Move.

SALEM, Aug. 5.—(AP)—District attorneys over the state indicated today that they may give Assistant Attorney General Ralph L. Moody little support in his fight to wipe out pinball and marble games.

Moody said Chief Justice Henry J. Bean's dismissal of injunction proceedings brought by two Salem operators would be a virtual death blow to the devices. But other operators have indicated they would appeal to the supreme court for a ruling on whether the games are a violation of the lottery laws.

The district attorney's office in Portland said something would be done to confiscate the machines. The circuit court in Portland has held that they can be operated for amusement only.

The Lane county district attorney said he was uncertain as to what action he would take. The county has banned them for more than a year, but the Eugene city officials, happy over license fees which the machines net for them, plan no action.

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The district attorney's office at Klamath Falls said it expected to shut down the games if there is a state-wide movement.
