MRS. GEORGE FAIR Brockway, Ore.
ALICE BRADLEY Roseburg, Ore.

1 12-oz. pkg. dates (seeded preferred)
2 1/2 cups white sugar
1/2 cup milk
1 tablespoon butter
1 cup nuts

Cut dates in small pieces and cook with the sugar, milk and butter until by testing in cold water a rather firm (but not too firm) ball can be made with the finger tips. Remove from fire, add one cup walnuts and beat until it commences to harden. Roll in cloth which has been wrung from cold water.

Variations: "Date Loaf Candy" 1 lb. dates, 3 cups sugar, 1 cup milk, 2 cups nuts. Rest as above.

WILMA ELLISON, Days Creek.
3 cups sugar
1 1/2 cups corn syrup
1 cup water
1/4 cup strained honey (if desired)

2 egg whites
2 cups nuts
1 teaspoon vanilla
Cook sugar, syrup, honey and water in a pan until brittle ball forms in cold water. Beat egg whites stiff, add syrup slowly, beat until stiff and waxy, add nuts and pour quickly in buttered pan. When cool, cut and wrap in waxed paper.
