Lethal Gas Takes Two Murderers

FLORENCE, Ariz., Aug. 13.—(AP)—The dawn of Friday, the 13th brought death today to two men—one white, the other black—in the gas chamber of Arizona state prison.

Hert Anderson, 53, white slayer of Cecil Kuykendall, 28-year-old ranch hand in a Prescott pool hall, and Ernest Patton, 290-pound negro who killed his common law wife because she trifled, were strapped in adjoining chairs for the double execution.

Anderson, emaciated and nervous, was pronounced dead in five minutes. Patton, hardy lumberjack, withstood the fumes twice as long.

Forty men and three women crowded into a small room and watched through glass panels. Warden Barnes refused to disclose the identity of the women.
