Main Portion of Mill Saved in Hard Fight; Owners Planning to Rebuild.

Wary firemen, eyes red-rimmed from a night spent in terrific heat and smoke, still battled today against flames which last night raged through the Ingham Lumber company plant at Glendale, causing damage roughly estimated at \$250,000. The flames, which cast a glare visible for more than 30 miles, destroyed the large planing mill, raised five dry kilns and consumed more than four million feet of lumber in kilns and stock piles.

Water to fight the blaze was pumped from the log pond by the mill's steam plant, which was put into operation after power lines were destroyed. The Grants Pass fire department sent one of its pumps to furnish additional streams of water. Chief Louis Stephens and Phil Harth of the Roseburg fire department made a hurried trip to Glendale to give personal aid, but Roseburg equipment was not required. A crew of CCC men from Camp Wimer was dispatched by Fred Southwick, supervising warden of the Douglas Forest Protective Association, to aid the volunteer fire fighters of Glendale.

The fire was believed to have started in a dry kiln filled with pine lumber. It was believed that the blaze had its origin in a spark from the waste fuel incinerator or the mill's switching locomotive. Dust and gas in the kiln caused an explosion, which threw fire into
