The local office is immediately contacting 21 foreign-born persons enrolled with the WPA here to obtain proof of naturalization or proof of application for citizenship. Where aliens have been naturalized or have applied for naturalization they become eligible for employment. A new ruling also grants preference to ex-service men. Fies reports, and proof of military service will be required in giving preferential assignments in the future.

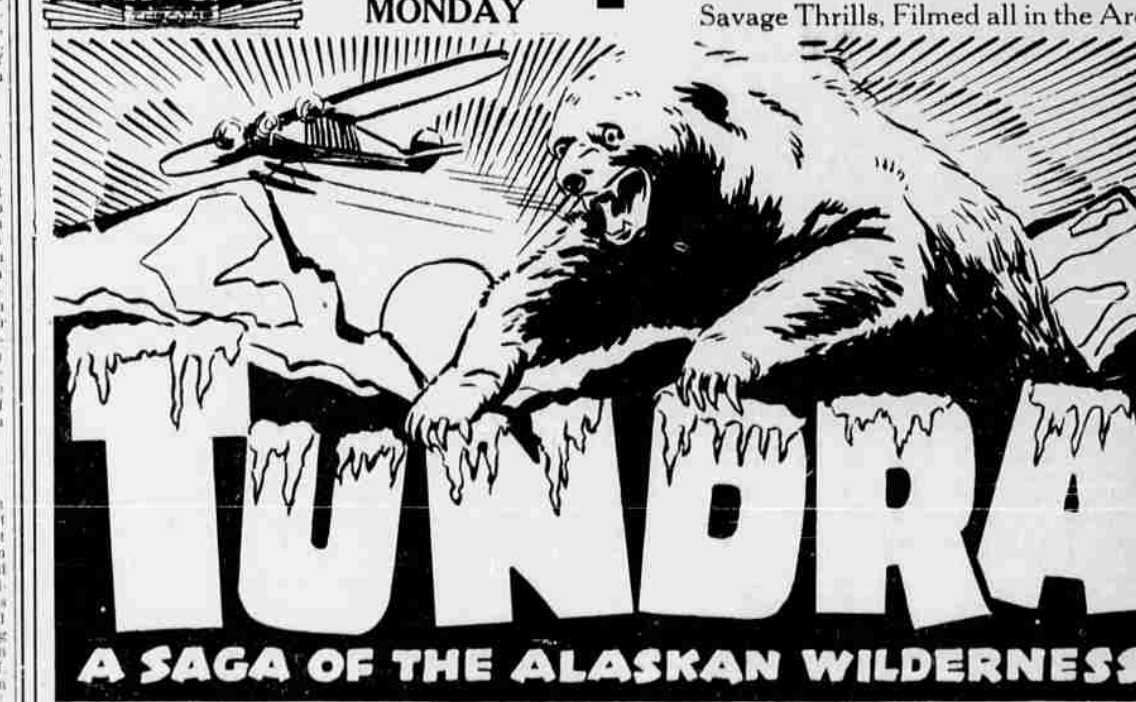
