MARKET REPORTS

BOSTON, Aug. 21.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin today says: "The wool market continues very quiet. Semi-occasional sales are reported here and there but for small quantities and the surface indications are that the market is weaker. Possibly there has been a slight tendency to let wool go in small lots at barely firm prices but the undertone of the market is exceedingly strong, and any effort to move wool in a large way would find prices very firm."

"The foreign markets are exceedingly strong. Bradford reports the price of wool against the buyer. Evidently, prices will rule firm at the opening of the new Australian season August 30, although think there will be an easier tone develop later as supplies increase. "The west, buying has been sporadic at prices showing little change."

"The piecemeal market, which is the real key to the situation, is very dull and disappointing. "Mohair is slow but firm."

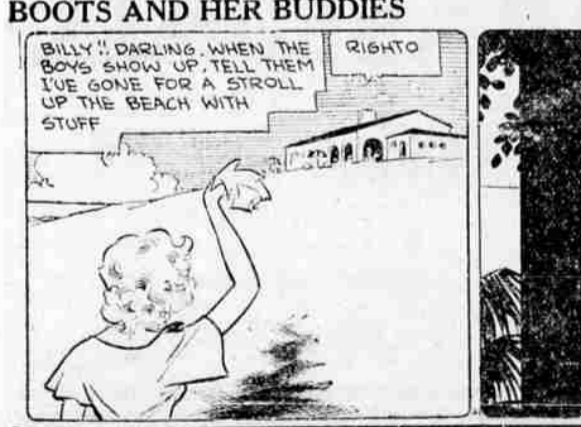

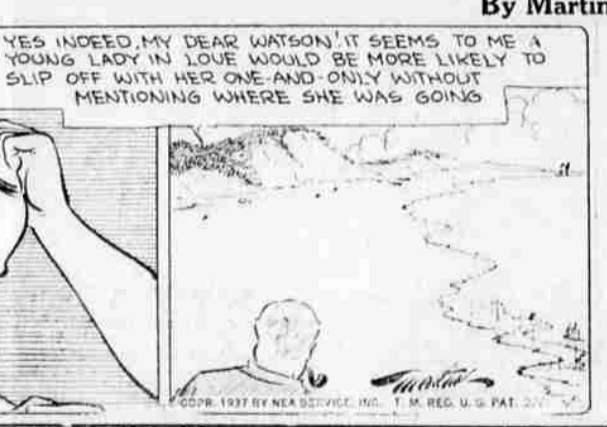
