Mute for Sixteen Years Veteran Able to Speak Again.
GRANTS PASS, Sept. 21.—(AP)—Emil Moore of the Murphy district can now tell how happy he is. More than six years ago he suffered a serious illness caused by injuries received in World war service. After his illness he was mute, although his hearing was unimpaired.
A short time ago while Mr. Moore was prospecting he was seized by a paroxysm of coughing, expelling several small pieces of bone. One larger piece lodged in his throat, and after removing it with his fingers, he was surprised to find that he could again talk.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Sept. 21.—(AP)—Robert Lee, 57, Marcola, Ore., recuperated at a hospital here today after plummeting 350 feet over a cliff in his automobile.

LONDON, Sept. 21.—(AP)—Justice Hugo L. Black of the United States supreme court has departed for home, still declining to comment on American newspaper accounts contending that he is a member of the Ku Klux Klan.
