

PINBALL "EXPERTS" FAIL BEFORE JURY

MEDFORD, Sept. 21.—(AP)—Charles R. Gay, retired, who testified this morning at the trial in circuit court of Earl A. Sims, charged with "setting up and operating a lottery" (pinball machine), had played the device "at least 3,000 times in the past three years," and claimed some proficiency, failed to score a pay hole hit in ten shots, on exhibit A, a seized pinball machine. In three preliminary shots Gay also hit nothing but the "out hole."

Gay was called by the state as expert witness, along with P. R. Harrison, retired, and H. N. Butler, garage owner, who also said they had played the pinball consistently and persistently over a considerable period.

The state has subpoenaed a number of county officials who have never played the device as witnesses.

The pinball machine for which Sims acted as agent in Jackson county was placed in front of the jury box, where the two men and two women jurors watched the witnesses show their proficiency.

The state in the case contends the pinball machines constitute a lottery, with the element of skill, if any, not contributing to the final result.

The defense holds an element of skill exists, and this removes them from classification as a lottery, under Oregon law.

Radio Plan Opposed

There also was considerable discussion concerning a proposed \$699 appropriation to pay a part-time operator to serve in tracing and eliminating radio interference, but a motion to include the appropriation in the budget was rejected by a vote of 5 to 1.

A. N. Orcutt served as chairman of the budget committee, and E. B. Hilde was elected secretary. F. W. Chapman and A. C. Martin were other members of the committee present, meeting jointly with the city council.

The tentative budget will be brought before the council at a later meeting for public discussion, and any persons having recommendations to make concerning changes will be given an opportunity to be heard before the proposed list of expenditures is finally adopted.

Total Reduced

The budget as approved by the committee calls for a total tax of \$89,775.00 as compared with \$93,682.96 for 1937. Of this sum of \$89,775.00, bond payments call for \$31,500.00, and interest payments \$12,925.00, a total of \$44,425.00, as compared with \$52,672.96, required for debt service in the 1937 budget.

The actual operating budget for 1935 is proposed in the sum of \$45,340.00 as compared with \$45,010.00 for 1937.

It was possible for the budget committee to have levied the sum of \$91,579.60 within the limitation of the state law.

Members of the committee were furnished by City Recorder A. J. Geddes with a detailed statement of budget allotments and expenditures for past years, together with

LOYALIST FORCES REPORT ADVANCES

Annihilation of two insurgent battalions was reported today from the far southern Spanish war front, midway between Cordoba and Badajoz, where government forces thrust forward in important gains.

Government dispatches declared one insurgent battalion was destroyed at Sima in a government counterattack following an insurgent advance protected by a heavy artillery barrage.

A second battalion, rushed up to reinforce weakened defenses of Granja de Torrehermosa, was wiped out where the government battle line balloon outward to within 100 miles of the Portuguese frontier.

Strategic government gains were reported in the region, 75 miles northwest of Cordoba, where activity has been relatively slight recently while government and insurgent forces concentrated on northern battlefields.

Government gains were disputed, however, by an insurgent communiqué that declared government counterattacks had been repulsed in the Granja de Torrehermosa sector and in the nearby Sierra de Tejonera mountains.

Government troops were reported to have taken heights dominating the vital east-west Penarroya railway and houses on the outskirts of Granja de Torrehermosa while cavalry forces were striking at insurgent lines that cut the road to Azuaga, ten miles south.

A hard battle in which insurgent forces accidentally turned their guns on one another was reported from the Aragon front, northeast of Madrid. Several casualties were inflicted when insurgents mistook as the enemy a patrol of their own which was under attack by government troops.

Denhardt died without uttering a word. A crowd gathered and Patrolman Jephtha Tracey came running up. Tracey said the three brothers gave up their pistols and surrendered quietly to him and that Roy said, "I did it."

At his first trial the jury disagreed and Denhardt's \$25,000 bond was revoked. He declared Mrs. Taylor committed suicide because of the threats of a jealous sister. The commonwealth contended Denhardt killed her last November 6 because she yielded to her family's objections and had declined to marry him.

Declaring his innocence, the Spanish American, Mexican border and World War veteran pleaded as he left court after the disagreement that "there will be no second trial." The trial was called at the September term, however, but Denhardt's words came true.

His sister, Miss Bertha Denhardt, who had stayed at his side during his trial, was at her home in Bowling Green last night when he was killed. Denhardt's former wife, Mrs. Elizabeth Glaze Denhardt, from whom he was divorced in 1933 after 32 years of wedlock, also lives in Bowling Green.

ITALY WILL JOIN IN PIRACY PATROL

ROME, Sept. 21.—(AP)—Italy agreed tonight to join Britain and France in anti-piracy patrol of the Mediterranean.

Foreign Minister Count Galeazzo Ciano advised the British and French governments of Italy's readiness to join the patrol, on the basis of parity with those two nations.

Britain and France, the Italian government said, have agreed to satisfy this demand.

Britain Gives Warning

LONDON, Sept. 21.—Britain decided today to make strong representations to Japan against the bombing of private property in Nanking.

The foreign office instructed Sir Robert Leake, British ambassador to Tokyo, to make the representations against bombing other than military objectives in the Chinese capital.

Sir Robert was instructed to make clear that Britain will hold Japan responsible for any damage to British lives and property.

The British naval commander in China delivered a similar warning to Japanese in Shanghai yesterday, and the British embassy had decided to remain open at Nanking despite a Japanese disclaimer of responsibility for foreign lives

STRANGLER SLAYS VICTORIA WOMAN

VICTORIA, Sept. 21.—(CP)—The battered body of Mrs. Helen Smith, 65-year-old widow, was found today in a vacant lot in the James Bay residential area of Victoria. Around the dead woman's neck was a man's necktie.

Investigating officers said the fact that Mrs. Smith's clothing was disarranged led them to believe she had been criminally assaulted. Her face was crushed and smeared with blood.
