

INDIANS' LINEUP BEING BOLSTERED

Marshall Shifted to Back-Field for Game Against Cottage Grove.

A shift in backfield lineup is expected to give the Roseburg Indians a much stronger style of play in Friday's football game at Cottage Grove. Coach Jim Watts reported today, Marshall, a recent transfer from Bend, who played his first game in an Indian uniform last week, going into the game against Medford as a tackle, is being shifted into the backfield as a blocker on offense. Working in scrimmage last night, Marshall's blocking gave a great improvement in running plays and Coach Watts was well pleased by the showing made. On defense Marshall will back up the line.

Coach Watts is greatly pleased by the way in which members of his squad have built up physical condition. The players have trained dutifully and the results are showing up well. In games already played the boys have suffered no serious injuries, despite the fact that they have been meeting superior weight, particularly in the Medford game, where they were outweighed fifteen pounds to the man.

High school coaches generally hold to the theory that good conditioning is the best safeguard against injuries, but find it difficult to get boys of that age to take training seriously. However, the Indians are in fine physical trim and this factor is evidenced in their endurance. They will probably taper off on hard training for the balance of the season, to prevent danger of going stale.

ENGLAND, FRANCE EASE UP ON ITALY

(By Associated Press.)
France and Great Britain charted today a moderate course in their efforts to get Italian soldiers with the insurgent army out of Spain.

Circles close to the French foreign office said it had been proposed Italy be given "a last change" to agree to withdraw troops from Spain.

Prime Minister Chamberlain and his foreign secretary, Anthony Eden, were believed to be leaning toward one of the 27-nation non-intervention committee in an attempt to reach an accord with Italy.

This indicated a decided loosening of the firm attitude adopted last week by the two nations. They had given Premier Mussolini "24 hours" to reply to a note inviting him to a discussion of the volunteer commitments in Spanish armies.

Mussolini declined to join in such discussions and suggested the non-intervention committee as the proper place for such discussion.

Thus it appeared neither the French nor the British are now inclined to take precipitate action, although last week both had hinted at such a possibility if it did not get together with them on the matter of setting foreign fighters out of Spain.

WILD STEER KILLS RODEO PERFORMER

NEW YORK, Oct. 12. (AP)—Far from his practice home, Walter Cravens, 29-year-old Oklahoma rodeo performer, rode the lone trail to "the last round up."

Cravens, once runner-up for the world's steer riding championship, was killed Saturday night by the slashing hooves of a wild steer in Madison Square garden.

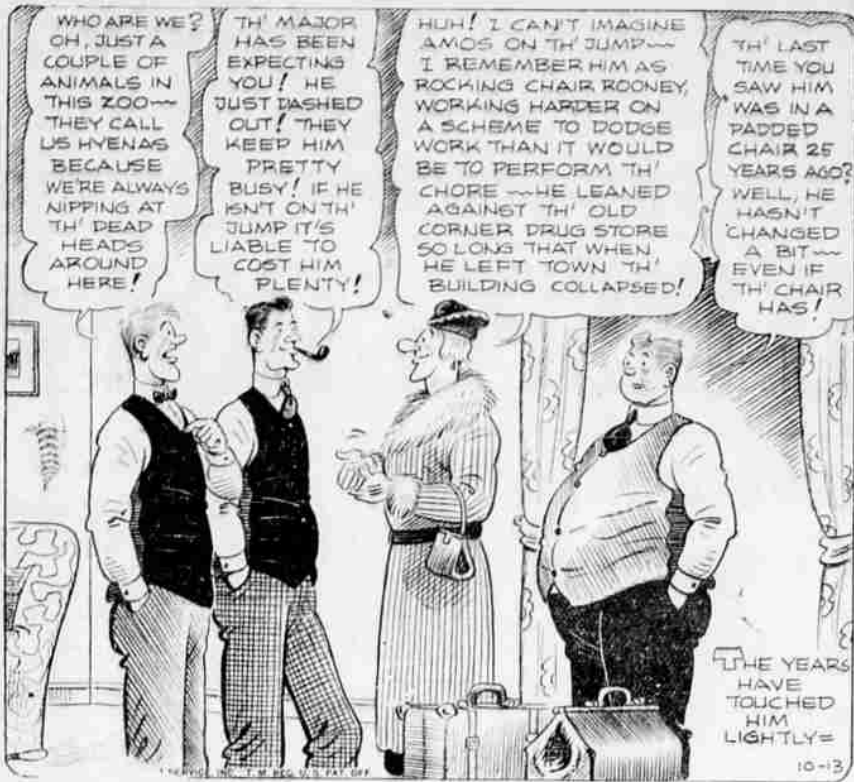
DR. MAUK LOSES IN DRUG PENALTY PLEA

NARCOTICS TRAFFIC GANG ROUNDED UP

MINNEAPOLIS, Oct. 12. (AP)—Federal agents, last night and early today, placed four rapid-fire raids that landed a reputed narcotics "kingpin" and eight others, including a woman, in jail.

William Hildebrandt, 48, former convict, was held by agents as the "kingpin" of a narcotics distribution system extending as far west as Seattle and as far southeast as Salt Lake City.

Joseph Bell, northwest supervisor for the federal bureau of narcotics, said agents had been trying to capture Hildebrandt, for 10 years.

Arthur Miller, who served a book-making and gambling term in St. Paul, was another one of those held.

A large quantity of narcotics, Bell said, was confiscated in the raids which began when Hildebrandt and a woman companion, who said she was Miss May Holitz, were arrested in Minneapolis.

"SMELLER" TO TEST DRIVERS OFFERED

Chemical Substitute for Cop's Nose Will Detect Alcohol's Presence.

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 12. (AP)—How much whiskey makes an unsafe driver?

Two fingers.

Dr. Ralph N. Harger, biochemistry professor at Indiana university, gave that estimate to the National Safety congress today, based on studies made with a "chemical breath smeller" with which he hopes to replace the policeman's nose as a test for intoxication.

Three ounces of whiskey—or a little less than two fingers—is enough to make the average motorist a peril to traffic, Dr. Harger said.

Discussing the "chemical breath smeller," Dr. Harger said it can detect the small amount of alcohol present in a single glass of beer.

"The policeman's nose for booze," he said, "is frequently unfair, though commonly accepted as evidence in court. In reality the color of the breath of one who has been imbibing is due more to the flavoring matter of the liquor rather than the small amount of alcohol."

But the "chemical breath smeller" can't be fooled.

"No larger than the ordinary camera, the scientific breath smeller used in the tests has as its nose a sensitive chemical reagent," he explained. "The fluid, normally a healthy pink color, is unaffected by onion or garlic, but pales at the slightest suggestion of alcohol on the driver's breath."

The degree with which the fluid pales is the giveaway on how much drinking the breather has been up to.

EXPLODING PAINT RAZES ELKTON HOME

ELKTON, Oct. 12. (AP)—The Charles Clements home at Elkton was completely destroyed by fire Saturday as a result of explosion of roof paint. Mr. Clements had placed the paint on the stove for warming, preparatory to use. The paint became too hot and exploded, causing complete loss of the building and its contents.

MRS. DEMPSEY TO RETURN TO STAGE

NEW YORK, Oct. 12. (AP)—Having William, announced her husband, Jack Dempsey, approved her return to the stage in Ed Wynn's next musical comedy "Honey For What?"

"Jack thinks it's a fine idea," said Mrs. Dempsey, who gave up

the stage six years ago when she married Roger Wolfe Kahn, wealthy band leader.

She made her theatrical debut when she was 8. She is 23 now.

The Dempseys have two daughters, aged 3 and 14 months.

EDUCATOR QUILTS OVER PEP RALLY

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 12. (AP)—Father T. R. Jones resigned today from the faculty of Duquesne university as a result of a rousing pep rally which preceded last Saturday's football game between Duquesne and the University of Pittsburgh.

Many students walked on the campus when they learned of the resignation and circulated a petition for the reinstatement of the priest who, Pittsburgh newspapers said, had told the pep meeting that Pitt players "play for their weekly pay checks."

Father Jones said he could not recall making the statement but if he did he said, "I certainly regret it."

President J. J. Callahan of Duquesne, who personally apologized to the University of Pittsburgh after the Duquesne students' rally, declined to say whether the school had asked for Father Jones' resignation. He said he would "answer that" in a day or so.

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FARLEY SAYS U. S. IN NO WAR DANGER
