PRESIDENT SPEAKS AT P. O. CEREMONY

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., Oct. 13.—(AP)—President Roosevelt said today the people were "rightly" talking freedom of religion and the press just as they did 150 years ago when New York state ratified the federal constitution.

Coming here from Hyde Park as a "neighbor," the chief executive spoke before a crowd of several thousand at the laying of the cornerstone of the city's new post-office.

The ceremony was the first of the day's events culminating a three-day celebration of the 250th anniversary of the settlement of this community as a Hudson trading post.

In tracing the history of the town the president recalled another milestone—the constitutional convention here which his great grandfather, Isaac Roosevelt, attended as a delegate.

G-MEN BEGIN WAR ON GIGGLE SMOKE

Marihuana Cigaret Trade, Banned in 46 States, Preys on Youth.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The federal government has formally entered the war against America's newest narcotic menace, the marihuana cigarette.

When the potent Harrison narcotic act was passed in 1914, "giggle smokes" were known only to a handful of Mexicans in the southwest and escaped inclusion. In the post-war jazz age they attracted attention of western peace officers as a frequent factor in juvenile crime, and by 1937 their danger was so widely recognized that 46 of the 48 states had outlawed them.

Easily Concealed

Now, under the form of an "excise tax law," congress had empowered Uncle Sam's trained dog hunters to go into action against marihuana.

"Marihuana is raised largely by Mexicans in the midst of cornfields," says W. G. Walker, chief of the California division of narcotic enforcement. "Five hundred pounds may be grown in a patch 100 feet square and hidden in 160 acres of corn."

"We have found it among the plants of a man's backyard garden and a park laborer even sowed it among his flowerbeds. The ordinary birdseed you buy for a canary is marihuana seed, so you see it is easy to start a crop."

Most Smokers Young

In late summer the plant's narrow leaves exude a powerful narcotic resin. The branches then are harvested, dried in the sun, crushed and rolled into cigarettes. These normally sell for 25 cents each.

A nationwide survey by Dr. Frank R. Gomila, New Orleans commissioner of public safety, shows a large proportion of marihuana smokers are boys and girls between 18 and 21. They refer to the cigarettes as "muggles," and to the effect as a "giggle." One cigarette of pure marihuana is usually good for a three-hour giggle.

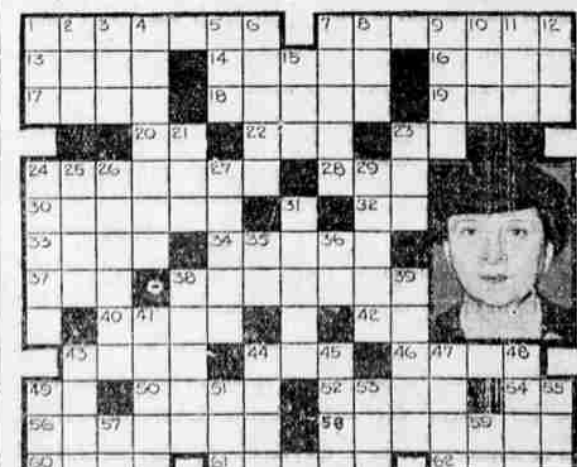

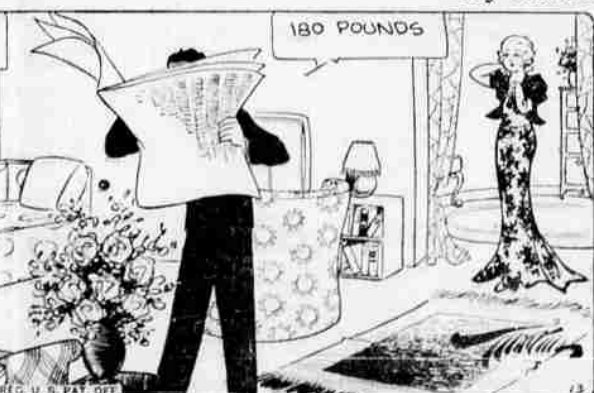

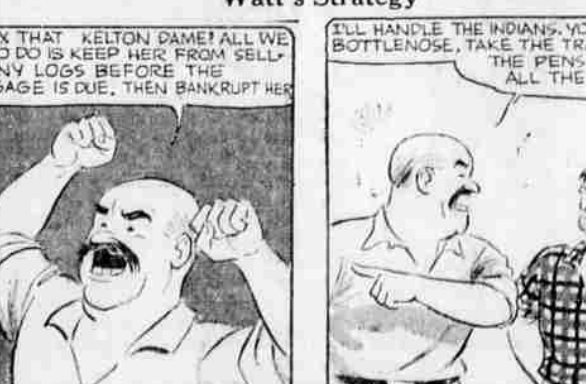
