

## U. S. PEOPLE HELD DICTATOR-PROOF

PENN. YAN, N. Y., Oct. 12.—(AP)—Frank E. Gamett asserted today that the American people's "common-sense, intelligence and patriotism" would block any move of the United States toward dictatorship.

The Rochester publisher shared the platform with Dr. Leland Robinson, Columbia university economist, at the semi-annual convention of Kappa Kappa.

Declaring that the power to determine provisions of the constitution should not be given either to the president or to congress, Gamett said:

"If the president had the power to declare an act unconstitutional, he could later make himself a dictator. If, on the other hand, congress were to be the judge of the constitutionality, it could easily make a scrap of paper of the constitution."

Dr. Robinson told the gathering that America must lead mankind away from the "intolerant and destructive forces" of communism and fascism, if it is to contribute to world order.

**Dalhousie To Face Charges**  
Meanwhile, as authorities of Indiana, Ohio and Maryland awaited official federal word as to where Dalhousie would answer charges, ranging from murder to jewel robbery.

Walton Walsh, 28-year-old G-man, wounded in the mid-morning fusillade, recuperated from a clean flesh wound in the shoulder.

Harold H. Reinecke, chief of the Indianapolis office of the federal bureau of investigation, expressed belief that Dalhousie would be returned there to stand trial on two murder charges.

Myron Gueney, chief G-man on the Brady job here, hinted the case was "far from being cleared up" and "several angles are being followed up," but he declined to disclose what lay ahead.

Elimination of the Brady gangsters, sought a year and a day over a trail leading ever eastward since they escaped from an Indiana jail, removed, either by death or imprisonment, the last of the "big shots" on the federal bureau's wanted list.

Two "mobs" still at large, justice department officials said, were "small fry" compared to Brady and his henchmen.

**Prisoners Being Executed**  
The execution of 5,000 insurgent prisoners held in Asturias prisons has "already begun," Generalissimo Franco charged in a telegram to Great Britain, France, the league of nations and the international red cross.

The insurgent leaders headquarters said the statement was made in reply to a previous message from the Asturian high command, in charge of the defense of Gijon, saying the defenders could not be held responsible for the safety of insurgent hostages if Franco's planes bombarded towns in which government prisons are located.

Four insurgent bombing planes raided Port Bou, just south of the eastern end of France's Spanish frontier, early today so badly that all rail traffic between France and Spain was interrupted for several hours. Merchandise en route to government Spain was reported destroyed.

## MAN ENDS 8 YEARS' CAREER AS "WIFE"

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—(AP)—The strange career in petticoats of William H. Richeson, 26, who lived six years as the "wife" of a Brooklyn harem-mistress, was ended today.

The slight, dark-haired defendant, his plucked eyebrows lowered, listened shyly yesterday to court testimony that he had posed as a woman for the last ten years.

Probation Officer George Hoekstra said the steamfitter, whom Richeson "married" at the municipal building October 13, 1931, never had suspected anything wrong and was "all broken up over the discovery."

Hoekstra said Richeson previously had worked four years as a waitress, chambermaid, hospital attendant and chorus girl.

The deception was revealed when he was arrested on a disorderly conduct charge and sent to the women's house of detention. Magistrate Sylvester Sabbatino sentenced Richeson to 90 days in the workhouse after his attorney, pleading for leniency, explained: "He gets a tremendous kick out of fooling people."

named Russian woman. The Japanese planes attacked the foreign cars near Minchong, 16 miles from Shanghai, while they were en route from the Chinese capital at Nanking.

**Error Not Understood**  
A Russian driver for the American-owned Bill Motor Co., D. E. Fittinghoff, said he was driving a flagless pilot car containing Rebeza, Abraham and a Chinese newspaperman a half a mile ahead of the other two cars and was not attacked.

Both Fittinghoff and Shinn declared they could not see how the Japanese could have mistaken the cars since Union Jacks were painted on top of the two attacked. Fittinghoff asserted he had mapped the route and details of the expedition for the British authorities to notify the Japanese.

The British embassy maintained that the Japanese had been informed of the trip. Japanese asserted that, while the Japanese navy was informed that a party of Britons was coming to Shanghai, the army was not advised and for that reason the fliers were uninformed.

## CROP CONTROL AND LABOR PROGRAM UP TO CONGRESS

gress said they saw no need for a special session, such administration leaders as Speaker Rankinhead (D-Ala.) said the president had exercised "good judgment."

Chairman O'Connor (D-N. Y.) of the house rules committee, which blocked the wage-hour bill in the last session, forecast it would be brought to the house floor swiftly.

The crop control bill, however, will have the right-of-way under a resolution adopted in August.

There were indications that two other issues might create time-consuming debate during the session—the former Ku Klux Klan, connections of Supreme Court Justice Hugo L. Black and the president's foreign policy.

**Permanent Peace Desired**  
Mr. Roosevelt apparently sought in his speech to allay criticism of his newly aggressive policy toward Japanese invasion of China. He emphasized that American participation in the nine-power treaty conference would be to seek by agreement a solution of the conflict.

"And the kind of peace we want," he said, "is the sound and permanent kind, which is built on the cooperative search for peace by all the nations which want peace."

Discussing his call for the special session, the president said it would enable congress to avoid a lengthy session next year during the pre-election campaign. Ordinarily congress would not meet until January 3.

"I know," he added, "that many enemies of democracy will say that it is bad for business, but for the tranquility of the country, to have a special session—even one beginning only six weeks before the regular session. Those who do not like democracy want to keep legislators at home."

**Job Not Finished**  
In his white house speech, which reviewed his trip to the west coast, the president said that "for most of the country this has been a good year," but that "we have not yet done all that must be done to make that prosperity stable."

The people "out through the country," he said, "want the financial budget balanced, but they want the human budget balanced as well."

Then, speaking in broad terms, the president outlined his five legislative proposals for the special session.

Discussing crop control first, he said: "The total amount of production largely determines the price of the crop, and, therefore, the difference between comfort and misery for the farmer."

"If we were foolish enough to run every shoe factory 24 hours a day, seven days a week, we would soon have more shoes than the nation could possibly buy—a surplus of shoes that would have to be destroyed, or sold at prices far below the cost of production."

"And I have heard big manufacturers talk about control of production by the farmer as an indefensible 'economy of scarcity.' And yet these same manufacturers never hesitate to shut down their own huge plants, throw men out of work, and cut down the purchasing power of whole communities whenever they think they must adjust their production to an overabundance of the goods they make."

"When it is their baby who has the measles, they call it 'economy of scarcity,' but 'sound business judgment.'"

**All-Weather Program Sought**  
"We intend this winter to find a way to prevent four and a half billion cotton, nine cent corn and thirty cent wheat—with all the disaster those prices mean for all of us—from ever coming back again."

"To do that, the farmers themselves want to cooperate to build an all-weather farm program so that in the long run prices will be more stable. They believe this can be done, and the national budget kept out of the red."

"We ought always to have enough food at prices within the reach of the consuming public. For the consumers in the cities of America, we must find a way to help the farmers to store up in years of plenty enough to avoid hardship in the years of scarcity."

Discussing regional planning, the president described reforestation and reclamation projects visited on his western trip. He said that that work "needs a more business-like system of planning and

greater foresight than we use today."

"That is why," the president added, "I recommended to the last session of the congress the creation of seven planning regions. . . . The congress will, of course, determine the projects to be selected within the budget limits."

Mr. Roosevelt's reference to the controversial government reorganization program was brief. He declared it does not conflict with democratic principles.

"To carry out any twentieth century program," he said, "we must give the executive branch of the government twentieth century machinery to work with."

"For many years we have all known that the executive and administrative departments are a highly-plagued network of duplicate responsibilities and overlapping powers."

**Would Hoist Wages**  
Turning to the wage and hour question, the president said: "American industry has searched the outside world to find new markets—but it can create on its very doorstep the biggest and most permanent market it has ever had."

"A few more fellow workers in wages, a better distribution of jobs with a shorter working day, will reduce the domestic trade barrier right here—right away—without waiting for any treaty."

"I am a firm believer in fully adequate pay for all labor. But right now I am most profoundly concerned in increasing the pay of the lowest-paid labor."

Apparently referring to southern objections to the wage-hour bill, the president said "foresighted business men already understand and agree with this policy," and added:

"They agree also that no one section of the country can permanently benefit itself, or the rest of the country, by maintaining standards of wages and hours for inferior to other sections of the country."

**Aims At Monopolies**  
Mr. Roosevelt, discussing monopolies, said most business men knew the government was "trying to make government more secure than ever before."

Whatever danger there was for property and profits, he declared, from restraints now imposed upon business by private monopolies and financial oligarchies.

"We are already studying how to strengthen our antitrust laws in order to end monopoly—not to hurt but to free legitimate business."
