power non-intervention committee, as proposed by Italy. The plan was said to provide a "last chance" for Italy to consent to withdrawal of her troops from Spain. France retained the privilege of "positive action" in case of Italian refusal during deliberations of the non-intervention committee. The French reservations would include the privileges of making arms shipments across the Pyrenees frontier and of taking "technical" measures to protect her communications in the Mediterranean.

French and British diplomats were said to be uneasy over the possibility of a diplomatic clash between Soviet Russia and Italy which might wreck the chances of an agreement at the non-intervention meeting expected to be called in London tomorrow.

The French and British were likely to introduce a plan for an international commission in Spain to supervise evacuation of foreign warriors from both sides of the 15-month-old conflict in Spain.
