power non-intervention committee, as proposed by Italy.

The plan was said to provide a "last chance" for Italy to consent to withdrawal of her troops from Spain. France retained the privilege of "positive action" in case of Italian refusal during deliberations of the non-intervention committee.

The French reservations would include the privileges of making arms shipments across the Pyreness frontier and of taking "technical" measures to protect her communications in the Mediterraneau.
