# Mother Surrenders Son As Slayer of His Father



The most dramatic climax to a San Francisco murder mystery came in connection with the finding of a man's body with head beaten in. U. S. fingerprint records identified him as Carl Jackson, formerly of Kansas City, apparently destitute and alone. Then his widow surrendered to police her son, Carl Jackson Jr., 29, San Francisco, declared he must have killed his father, "and if he did, I know it was in self-defense." She told of years of abuse from Jackson, of coming to live with her son, and Jackson coming West to threaten them and demand money. # STOCK SWINDLER FREED FROM PRISON

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 20.—(AP)—By virtue of a presidential order, Jacob Berman was freed today after serving seven years in prison for his part in the C. C. Julian oil frauds.

The so-called "bright boy" of the Julian oil case was convicted in Los Angeles in 1928 of using the mails to defraud in connection with asserted \$10,000,000 over-insurance of stock in Julian enterprises. Two years later he was convicted of forgery in state courts.

Berman walked out of jail yesterday, exclaiming:

"Boy, what a relief after seven and a half years. I want to just rest, to enjoy this free air for a while."
