

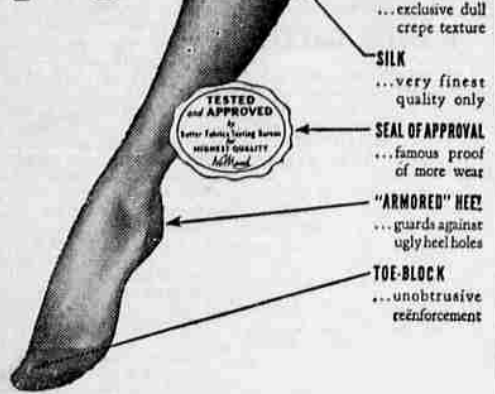
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GOSSIP of the GRIDIRON

SEATTLE, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Either the Washington Husky reserves are weak or the Washington front are strong, but, either way, the fact remained today that the Husky reserve line was the last night's practice session, 12-6.

While Coach Jimmy Phelan kept his varsity under wraps, the reserves, paced by Charley Russell, flashy negro halfback, found the green hats more than they could handle, and Phelan came away glooming at Washington's prospects against Stanford here Saturday.

Still tinkering with his backfield, Phelan had demoted Russell to the second string, working Capt. Fritz Waackowitz with the regulars.

In contrast to the pepper shown Tuesday night, the Huskies were flatless in last night's workout, their last strenuous drill before the game.

PALO ALTO, Calif., Oct. 21.—(AP)—Still not at full strength, 35 Stanford football players will en-train tonight for Seattle and their game Saturday with Washington. Left End Neil Rasmussen has a badly sprained ankle and Left Tackle Pete Zagar has a case of boils. Neither may play.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 21.—(AP)—The Bruins of U. C. L. A. will enter their game with Washington State Saturday in tip top shape.

INDIANS DRILL HARD FOR FRIDAY'S GAME

R. H. S. Gridsters Shaping for Eugene Foes, Whose Punter Is Feared.

"Rain or shine," next Friday night will make no difference to a band of determined Indian football players, for they are all set to play forty-eight minutes of wide-open football against University high school of Eugene.

For the past week, Coach Jim Watts has had the whole squad laboring long hours on Finlay field perfecting the aerial attack, polishing up on laterals and on a "general overhaul" of running plays and defense. Each game the Indians have played this season has shown decided improvement in every department, but, under the "eagle-eye" of Coach Watts, there is still plenty of work to do every night.

University high school comes more or less unknown as to general ability with that football, but one thing is known, and feared by Coach Watts, and that is the punting ability of Sargeant, the Golden Tide's right half, who, the saying goes, punts them high and far. In previous games this year, it is reported that Sargeant has averaged better than 40 yards per kick, both with a dry and a wet ball, and many of them have been known to sail 50 and 60 yards on the fly. To offset this distinct advantage in this end of the game, Watts has had Pete Rutter, Roseburg's flashy speedster and safety man, practice punt returning with the hope that in the game Rutter will be able to run back some of those punts far into enemy territory. Rutter is fast and shifty enough to break away at any time, which means that the fans might see University high punts turned into Roseburg touchdowns.

Roseburg's running attack is also beginning to click. Sanders is showing up especially well in the right half position, and Howard Fritts, plunging fullback, has also pounded through the line for considerable yardage during practice sessions. Pass defense has also been given considerable work, as has the line. Friday the Indians will be playing against a team nearer their own weight for the first time this season, so Roseburg supporters should see the line function as a line should.

Last night's practice was given over to kicking and punt returning, passing and pass defense, and dummy scrimmages. The squad will taper off with a light signal drill under the lights tonight at 7 p. m. The entire squad down to the last reserve is in excellent condition and is raring to give Roseburg football enthusiasts their first win on the home stomping grounds.

GEHRIG STILL TOPS RECORD SMASHERS

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—(AP)—Lou Gehrig's announced campaign to eclipse some of the marks Babe Ruth and Ty Cobb set up for the record books didn't get far during the 1937 season, but it was a big year for the "iron horse," nevertheless.

The Yankees' iron man first baseman revealed his ambition after the 1936 campaign. Through the recent season he succeeded only in wiping out two of the Bambino's all-time highs, and tying another.

But he was still the year's leading record-buster, accounting for six of the ten big league marks that were bettered, and one of the ten that were equaled.

All told, three of Ruth's records went by the boards. Gehrig surpassed the Babe's mark for the player driving in 150 or more runs for the most years, turning the trick for the seventh time in his career, and for the batter hitting for a total of 300 or more bases for the most years, collecting that total for the 12th time to end a tie with the Babe.

York Sets New Mark The other Ruthian swat standard to go was shattered by the Tigers' rookie wallpaper Rudy York, when he clouted 18 homers during August, one more than the previous one-month top which Ruth set up during the September of his record-smashing season back in 1927.

By scoring 100 or more runs for the 12th year in his career, Gehrig deadlocked Ruth at the head of the record books. In addition, Larruping Lou stretched his consecutive-game playing record to 1965 games; played 150 or more games for the 11th year in his career for another new mark; set a new high of 29 homers with the bases loaded during his playing career; topped his own mark by scoring 100 or more runs for the 12th straight year, and broke a tie with Al Simmons for a new mark of 12 years in a row for driving in 100 or more tallies.

The most unusual mark of all for the books this season was that the Pittsburgh Pirates produced in whipping the Cincinnati Reds 21 times in 22 starts during the season, tying the all-time high for the most victories scored by one club over another in one year.

Paul Waner of the Pirates set a National league record with 200 or more hits for the eighth year.
