HUNDREDS PERISH IN SYRIAN FLOODS

Prince Indicted On Charge of Murder



Facing second-degree murder indictment in connection with the slaying of his half-caste common law wife, Arville Kinzie, 22, Prince David Kalakaua Kawannoa, above, is being held by Honolulu police. He is the last surviving member of the Hawaiian royal family and a grandnephew of the last male monarch of the islands. The prince is alleged to have slain the woman with a piece of broken crockery during a wild party. He was already on probation on an old manslaughter charge growing out of the death of a young woman in an automobile accident in 1931.

U. S. DEBT SLASH IN 1938 MAY DROP TWO BILLION IN TAX-FREE SECURITIES

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—(AP)—A balanced federal budget probably would send the owners of \$2,000,000,000 in tax-free government securities searching for new fields of investment, fiscal authorities said today. They said a substantial sum—perhaps \$400,000,000 to \$500,000,000—may be included in the 1938 budget for paying off existing debt. This plan operation of financial provisions of the social security and railroad retirement acts, would liquidate about \$2,000,000,000 of federal obligations now in the hands of the public. Under the security and railroad pension laws about \$1,500,000,000 of the government debt will be shifted from private holders to the treasury during the next fiscal year. This transfer will be accomplished by retiring present outstanding obligations as they mature. Then, instead of selling new securities to the public, the treasury will issue special obligations to security and railroad pension reserve accounts.

PLEA TO EASE FOREIGN ZONE PERIL HEADED

SHANGHAI, Oct. 31.—(Sunday)—(AP)—China's "lost battalion" early today successfully ran the gauntlet of heavy Japanese fire to withdraw into the safety of the international concession behind American and British defense lines.

HEROIC CHINESE TROOPS GAIN SAFETY OF BRITISH LINES THROUGH SPRAY FROM JAP ARTILLERY

More than 400 of the unit which had defied besieging Japanese for four days in devastated Chapei dashed through the walling British army lines. They were disarmed and will be interned for the rest of the war. The Chinese brought out in triumph the huge Chinese flag which had flown over their warehouse fortress. Last to reach safety was Colonel Hsieh Chin-Yuan, battalion commander, who said Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek had sent direct orders to bring the unit out because the country felt it was "too valuable to be spared."

JAPAN ACCUSES ENGLAND; WARNS

TOKYO, Oct. 30.—(AP)—An unofficial group of highly placed Japanese officials charged that Britain was helping China in her war against Japan and warned that Anglo-Japanese diplomatic relations might be broken if this continued.

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
