

INDIANS LEAVE FOR COOS BAY BATTLE

Speed and Aerial Offense to Combat Marshfield Weight Advantage.

A band of twenty-eight Indian braves, under the leadership of "Big Chief" Jim Watts, left Roseburg this morning for Coos bay, where they will play the strong Marshfield high school eleven, in what should be one of the most exciting football games yet played by the local school this season.

The Roseburg high school aggregation boasts plenty of speed and deception, a strong aerial offense, and a running attack which has yet to be stopped completely. The Indians will again be outwitted both on the line and in the backfield, as they have been in nearly every game played this year, but so far such an advantage has not stopped them, for they have scored three touchdowns in every contest, except the Medford fracas, where they were held to a lone seven points.

This is the tenth meeting between the two schools. Roseburg has lost six, tied two, and won but one game, and that last season on the local field. The Indian squad is determined to break the monopoly that Marshfield has had on the victories, and intend to bring home their second straight win. LOYALISTS, REBELS CLAIM TRIUMPHS

HENDAYE, Franco - Spanish Frontier, Oct. 30 (AP) - A treacherous communique reported today that a Spanish government attack in the Cuesta de la Reina sector, about 20 miles south of Madrid, had been beaten off.

A communique announced an insurgent surprise attack on the Guadalajara front, northeast of Madrid, was repulsed yesterday at great cost to the insurgents.

(The Guadalajara front was the scene of a great insurrection defeat late in March when Madrid defenders hurled back a threatening army described as almost wholly Italian.)

The government report said the insurgents were driven back into their own trenches, along the road from Guadalajara northeast toward Sorja, leaving a great number of dead and wounded on the battlefield.

(A dispatch direct from Madrid told a government announcement that 800 persons had been killed and more than 4,000 injured by shells and bombs in the nearly year-old siege of the former capital.)

(Observers found the official estimates surprisingly low - about five casualties for every 1,000 persons over a period that included 30 air raids, 50 heavy shellings and innumerable light bombardments.)

JURY DISAGREES IN \$50,000 DAMAGE SUIT

PORTLAND, Oct. 30 (AP) - The jury in the \$50,000 damage suit trial of Mary Johns, Pendleton, against Z. K. Smith, Portland automobile dealer, disagreed last night after some 10 hours of deliberation.

Counsel for the plaintiff said a request probably would be made Monday for a new trial. Miss Johns alleged she suffered a broken leg and other injuries when Smith's automobile struck her here January 3.

ACTIS GETS VERDICT OVER JACK GIBBONS

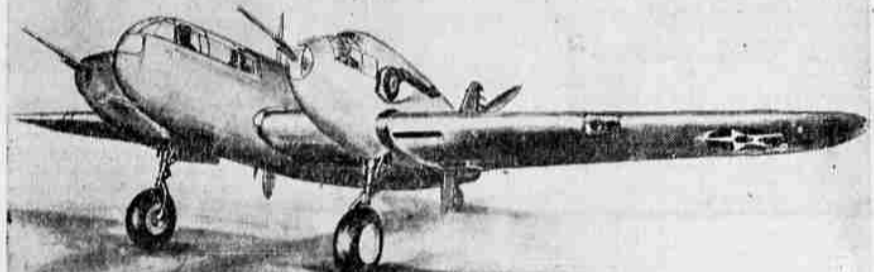

Uncle Sam Tops Air Challenges With Fastest Fighter



"It is believed this plane can overhaul any air targets," is the modest way the U. S. Army Air Corps announces the development of the fastest fighting plane in the world, the XF-1, sketched above. So revolutionary is the craft that new tactics for its use must be worked out. It is a multi-seater, carrying a crew of five; has two engines operating pusher types of propellers, which give the gunners in the fighting cockpit, at each side of the pilot's cockpit, freedom to fire in any direction; is capable of climbing to 30,000 feet. The armament consists of six machine guns and light bombs. The Bell Aircraft Corporation of Buffalo built the experimental model.

VALUABLE COLLECTION OF RARE COINS TO BE SHOWN IN ROSEBURG

Monetary History Represented in Exhibit Offered by Branch of United States National Bank; Over-Weight "Oregon Beavers" Included; Temporary Contributions to Display From Local Residents Requested.

Numbering approximately 750 coins and rated one of the most important collections on the Pacific coast, a collection of coins owned by the United States National Bank of Portland will be on public display in the lobby of the bank's Roseburg branch from November 3 to 29. The collection, valued at between \$40,000 and \$50,000, includes a number of very rare coins in both gold and silver. Two gold pieces, known as "Oregon Beavers," were minted in Oregon City in 1849 of pure gold, no alloy whatever having been used. Only a few of such coins are still in existence. They are valued at \$100 each. Another feature is a very complete group of United States silver dollars, starting with one coined in 1795.

Traces Monetary History E. S. McClain, manager of the Roseburg branch, says that the collection was started in 1859 and has been developed by officers of the bank as a project of educational and historical value to the public. It constitutes a graphic and visual history of the nation's monetary styles from the earliest days of the republic down to recent times. The collection likewise serves, officers of the bank here believe, as a reminder that sound money and the sensible saving of money are national assets.

Permission to retain the gold coins in the display as objects of great historical value was granted when gold coins generally were recalled from circulation by the federal government.

Local Coins Wanted Believing that many rare and interesting coins may be owned by residents of the Roseburg area, the bank has invited all who own such coins to bring them in for display during the time that the United States National bank's collection is here. New savings accounts for children will be awarded by the local branch for the oldest United States coins brought in for display. The local coins will be displayed in a case in the bank with the owner's name attached.
