

PASTOR DEFIANT ON WINDSOR REBUFF

PARIS, Nov. 12. (AP)—The Rev. J. L. C. Dart, asked by his superior for information on his refusal to the Duke of Windsor, said today he probably would answer but "no one on this earth has the ecclesiastical right to demand an explanation of me; neither the Bishop of Fulham nor anyone else."

The Rev. Dart had said, "I would rather the duke did not attend the service."

The duke also had commented on the attitude of the Church of England toward divorce and remarriage, replying church criticism of the former monarch's marriage to a divorcee.

The rebuff caused Windsor to cancel his plans to attend the ceremony. Associates said he was "stunned."

The Bishop of Fulham, who supervises all Anglican churches on the continent, said "the matter would appear ended" since the year had expired.

The Rev. Dart said the bishop's letter was not a demand for a report but more in the nature of a personal note asking for information.

The European edition of the New York Herald Tribune editorially criticized the view, declaring that Windsor "already is beginning to appear in the guise of a martyr to his own convictions which are more widely shared than was thought."

"Neither ecclesiastical practice nor Anglican moral theology would sanction any churchman hating a man from church for marriage reasons," the newspaper said.

MAYOR BACKS ROLL CALL OF RED CROSS

Uplift local support for the annual Red Cross roll call, now under way throughout the nation, and scheduled to be held in a one-day solicitation in Roseburg Monday, Mayor A. J. Young today issued the following proclamation:

"Once again the time has come for our community to demonstrate its concern for maintaining a very necessary part of our civic welfare program—the work maintained by the Douglas chapter of the American Red Cross."

"It is not necessary for me to remind citizens that the work of the Red Cross is a vital contribution to our community's welfare. The Red Cross asks little, yet contributes much to the general welfare of our people."

"We have all seen, during the past year, how effective Red Cross work is, both from the standpoint of the year-round program and that done during times of great national emergency."

"Perhaps never before has the work of this great national agency been so universally endorsed as in this year during the gigantic relief operation in the devastating floods in the Ohio and Mississippi river valleys. It was a great work, done in an efficient manner, and truly deserves our most sincere commendation."

"The annual roll call of the Red Cross, through which such fine work is supported, is from November 11th to Thanksgiving day. Memberships enrolled during that time will support the work for the year ahead of us."

"As Mayor of Roseburg it gives me pleasure to set aside the designated period for the Red Cross roll call and to ask all to renew their memberships or to join for the first time."

SEAMEN FROM LOST FREIGHTER RESCUED

NEW YORK, Nov. 12. (AP)—Six seamen from a storm-tossed lifeboat, were rescued off Cape Hatteras today, five hours after the Greek freighter Tzeny Chaudris, loaded with scrap iron, sank suddenly before dawn, in a southeast gale.

All the remaining twenty-three members of the crew, eight who were lifeboats were foundering in the high seas, and fourteen were somewhere on stormy Diamond shoals in another lifeboat, according to Radio Marine and Mackay radio dispatches received by the U. S. coast guard. One crew member was apparently unaccounted for.

WILBUR REPLIES TO HOOVER'S 'ENEMIES'

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Nov. 12. (AP)—Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur, president of Stanford University, said "enemies" of Herbert Hoover are spreading reports he seeks the 1940 republican nomination for president.

"These enemies," Dr. Wilbur said, "are resorting to their old tactics of charging Mr. Hoover with selfishness."

He declared the purpose was to injure Mr. Hoover's influence as a republican leader.

FALLING PLASTER INJURES YOUTHS

Swimming Instruction Major Activity for Red Cross

An aggregate total of 529 people took part in these classes—a record number for Douglas county, a larger number than taught in Multnomah county. A total of 369 people learned to swim; 155 took advanced swimming and 65 took life saving. Of the number taking life saving, we were able to certify 29 people as Red Cross life savers. This means not only money saved for your community, but what is far more precious—safety for your children. We hope to continue this work on an even larger scale another summer. BOSTON, Nov. 12. (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin today says: "There is a distinctly better tone in the wool market this week, owing chiefly to the reversal in form in the top futures market but more especially to the better political news from Washington. Holders of wool have tightened their quotations and there is less willingness to listen to offers that are unduly low."

"Manufacturers have found little response in the goods market as yet but that is regarded as a matter of time. Foreign markets have been a bit easier this week but still are rather above this market."

"In the west, there has been little movement and the changed tone in the market is likely to strengthen holding sentiment among growers."

"Mohair still is slow and largely nominal in price."

JURY WOULD AID INDICTED SLAYER

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 12. (AP)—Several members of the San Francisco grand jury that indicted a 26-year-old former Kansas City, Mo., man on charges of murdering his father today offered financial aid for his defense.

Grand Jury Foreman Marshall Hall said he and several other jurors felt the defendant, Carl V. Jackson, Jr., "deserved a break."

District Attorney Brady quoted young Jackson, an electrical contractor, as saying he had brought his mother, Mrs. Edith Jackson, from Kansas City to escape his father's drink-inspired brutality.

The elder Jackson followed his wife to San Francisco.

Young Jackson declared to Brady he defended himself against a knife in his father's hands.
