

**DEALERS VIEW 1938 FORD CAR MODELS**

**OREGON EVENTS FLASHED FROM WIRE SERVICE**

**PORTLAND, Nov. 22.—(AP)—**Indictments returned by a Multnomah county grand jury charged Fred W. German and Frank M. German, his son, with embezzlement and larceny by failure on four counts.

Conviction of Frank German on a previous charge recently was set aside in circuit court. Another indictment against him and two against Fred German are pending. Both were officials of the Fred W. German Realty company.

**LA GRANDE, Nov. 22.—(AP)—**The third burglary in three days in Union county occurred over the weekend when the safe of a flour mill at Union was blown and \$25 stolen. Earlier in the week, two La Grande business establishments were burglarized.

**NEWPORT, Nov. 22.—(AP)—**O. V. Brown, street superintendent, decided to sluice out the catch basins of the city's drainage system. He attached a hose with a curved nozzle to a hydrant and turned on the water. The second pressure tore it out of his hands and before he could get it under control, three large plate-glass windows in a store were blown out and a show case damaged.

**PENDLETON, Nov. 22.—(AP)—**Henry Arkell, Pendleton patrolman, left an overnite parking ticket on the car of Dr. Fred E. Farnor, local dentist, Saturday. The dentist pleaded guilty to the traffic charge today and paid \$1 fine. He said he intended to move his car sooner, but was kept busy overtime completing dental work for the patrolman's daughter.

**SILVERTON, Nov. 22.—**Paul Coyne of Monitor, Ore., is reported in a serious condition at a local hospital with injuries received when his automobile collided with another Monday afternoon. The driver of the second vehicle, whose name was not known to the authorities, brought Coyne to Silverton.

**PORTLAND, Nov. 22.—**Hilary Bell told police he was wanted at Louisville, Ky., whence he had fled when he found some \$200 had been taken from the safe of the store he managed. Police telegraphed an inquiry and found Bell was not wanted—but his store keys were.

**ALLEGED LOLETA BANK BANDITS HELD**

EUREKA, Calif., Nov. 22.—(AP)—United States Commissioner James found Ralph E. Johns, 35, and Weldon McAninch, 25, over to a federal grand jury on charges of bank robbery and assault with a dangerous weapon, with bail set at \$50,000 each.

A complaint signed by an FBI agent charges the two, who came here four months ago from Portland, Ore., held up the bank at Loleta last Friday, taking \$55,229.99 in cash, stocks and bonds.

Sheriff Ross said all but approximately \$3,000 in cash had been recovered.

Officers reported Johns had confessed participation in the holdup, but that McAninch denied the charges.

**GAS KILLS WAR VET AND FAMILY OF FOUR**

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., Nov. 22.—(AP)—Raymond C. Yeoman, 46, Canadian World War veteran and star athlete during his college days, his wife and their three children died today of illuminating gas poisoning.

Medical Examiner DeLuca said the gas seeped through a crack in their cellar wall from a leak in a street main.

Yeoman was associate general secretary of the Young Men's Christian association here.

**SPANISH REBELS BOMB COAST CITIES**

MADRID, Nov. 22.—(AP)—Spanish coastal cities from Barcelona to Valencia were bombed today by insurgent air raiders operating from their Mallorca island base.

Among the towns attacked were Tarragona, Benicarlo, Peniscola and Amposta. Two planes dropped loads of bombs on Peniscola and Benicarlo, with rather heavy casualties.

These bombers attacked Tarragona and, after a fight with government aircraft, flew out to sea off Amposta.
