SIT-DOWN STRIKE CASE GETS QUIETUS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—(AP)—The supreme court ordered dismissal today of litigation involving constitutionality of sit-down strikes.

It sent the case back to the federal district court at Philadelphia with instructions to dismiss "upon the ground that the cause is moot" since the strike had been settled long ago.

This action had been requested by the Apex Hosiery company of Philadelphia, the scene of a sit-down strike last summer conducted by the American Federation of Full Fashioned Hosiery Workers. In answer to a supreme court order to show cause why the case should not be dismissed as moot, the labor organization asserted an action against it for damages for alleged violation of the Sherman anti-trust act was still pending.

This was the first litigation involving sit-down strikes to reach the supreme court.

The Wagner labor relations act, often described as the "Magna Carta of labor," was employed by

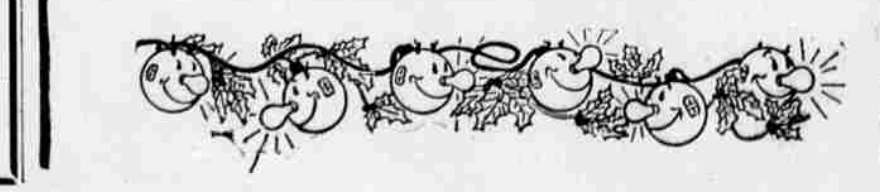
