UNITED KINGDOM TOPS ALIEN BUYERS

PORTLAND, Jan. 6.—(AP)—The United Kingdom was the largest purchaser of products which moved through the port here in record-breaking 1937. More than six million dollars worth of wheat, sugar, apples, pulp and lumber were shipped to the British empire. The Philippines ranked second, taking nearly five million dollars worth of goods. Japan imported \$3,740,000 through this port. Argentina \$2,923,000, and Holland \$1,930,000.
