BUSINESS UPTURN BY APRIL FORECAST

KANSAS CITY, Jan. 6.—(AP)—A business upturn by April 1 was predicted today by Guy T. Helvering, collector of internal revenue, who said he believed by then a wage and hour bill would be law and that will give business a basis for its cost figuring.

He said he doubted the undistributed corporation profit tax would be repealed but said it probably would be amended. "To help delinquent corporations," he expressed belief tax collections for this fiscal year would exceed by a billion dollars last year's total of more than four and a half billion.

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250 DOGS DESTROYED IN DOUGLAS IN '37

During the first year of operation under the county dog control board, the task of handling the dog situation in Douglas county has resulted in the destruction of 250 strays or killers, and the finding of suitable homes for 150 canines. Tom Fletcher, law enforcement officer for the board, reported today.

The dogs killed were largely mongrels, worthless strays, vicious and killer dogs, and those otherwise held to be useless.

Homes have been found for practically all dogs of good breed. Fletcher states. Many of these were dogs which apparently had been lost or abandoned by tourists, or by persons who moved from the county leaving the dogs without care.

Little trouble has been encountered, he reports, in placing good dogs, and, in fact, there is a waiting list of nearly 100 applicants, most of whom have specified dogs of certain breeds.

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
