

FRANK SAYS MAGIC WON'T CURE WOES

America Needs Intelligent Leadership, Republican Chief Declares.

NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—(AP)—Dr. Glenn Frank, head of the program committee of the republican party, told the New York board of trade today "we must divest ourselves of faith in magic as a way out of the difficulties of our generation."

Asserting that obstacles had been placed in the path of the competition of free enterprise, he said:

"The sooner we learn there are no rabbits in the hat, that artificial devices are a delusion and that the national future must be based on the normal enterprise of its people, it will be better for us and our children."

"There is no law in the political policy or economic practice of our nation that steady and responsible intelligence cannot correct."

"America is not dying. The ranks of business men, industrialists and financiers are not devoid of intelligence, competence, and social responsibility."

"The political genius of the nation is neither bankrupt nor under monopoly."

"There is a vast fund of leadership in the nation that suffers neither from the rigor mortis of reaction nor from the St. Vitus dance of irresponsible Utopianism."

"It is for us as a people to find and to follow that sort of leadership and to help it lift the standards around which the stable intelligence, effective competence and social sense of Americans who believe in democracy and in intelligently modernized economy of private enterprise can rally."

ESPOUSE TARIFF SLASH, KNOX ADVISES G. O. P.

CLEVELAND, Jan. 12.—(AP)—Col. Frank Knox wants the republican party to endorse reductions in "excessive" tariff rates that "protect monopoly."

Party experience with the tariff, he held today, dictates "a lesson which can be ignored only at the peril of defeat in 1940."

In an address which he called "deliberately provocative," the 1936 vice-presidential candidate said his party should follow tariff revision by telling farmers to expect no cash bonuses for crop destruction. Then, he said, the government should provide a "dollar redemption in gold."

Col. Knox's address differed in some respects from the party's last platform, which called for "efficient" tariff protection against "destructive competition" and "reasonable" benefits upon the "domestically consumed portion" of crops which show exportable surplus.

Knox said republicans lost in the 1912 and 1932 elections after an upward revision of the tariff. This revision contributed to defeat in 1928, he asserted, "by emphasizing party domination by large business interests, enriched through the indirect subsidy of an excessively high tariff, under which they were freed completely from competition in the domestic market."

FOUR ARRESTED IN SLAVE RING PROBE

SEATTLE, Jan. 12.—(AP)—A man and three young women were held here today following their arrest by federal bureau of investigation agents in connection with an alleged white slave ring operating in Portland, Tacoma and Bremerton.

Charles Dunn, 43, salesman, was charged with transporting women in interstate commerce for immoral purposes. Dale O'Brien, 27; Gladys Evans, 27; and Audrey Butler, 24, were held as material witnesses. Two other defendants were sought.

SHANGHAI SERVICE RELATED BY TABER

Experiences in the western city of Shanghai while a member of the international police force was told the Roseburg Rotary club at its Thursday luncheon meeting. Ashley Taber, recently returned from China, where he had served for five years on the international police force in the city of Shanghai, related some of the difficulties experienced in handling the situation there. He described the physical arrangement of the city and its government. Taber, 40, left China until November and was in Shanghai during a part of the Japanese attack. He described some of the bombing raids and street fighting which he witnessed.

TRAGEDY IN JAIL LEADS TO ARREST

SALEM, Jan. 12.—(AP)—Charged with involuntary manslaughter in connection with the death here of George D. Chaffee last December 15, Chester Rogers is held in custody at Medford and will be brought to Salem.

Chaffee, well known in Salem and other Willamette valley places, and who was connected with a planing mill at Silverton at the time of his death, died in the city jail as a result of a blow on the head, according to the findings of an autopsy. He had been picked up unconscious on a Salem street and booked on a drunk charge, but

failed to recover complete consciousness and died at the jail. Police say they have evidence that Rogers struck the blow.

PRICE RAISE FORCED ON NEWSPAPERS

NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—(AP)—In every section of the country advancing production costs have pushed up the prices which millions of readers pay for their daily newspapers.

This was disclosed today in a national survey which showed that while the upward movement was in no sense universal it had been manifested in every area—southwest, midwest, east, south and far west.

In some cases, price increases were announced toward the close of 1937, while in others they were not put into effect until well after the beginning of the new year.

More than 180 newspapers—from California to Rhode Island, from Maine to Florida—were shown to have put up their prices, some in all categories such as home delivery, mail delivery and street sales.

The far west led all regions in the total number of newspapers advancing their prices—60. The midwest reported 43; the east 42; the south 28 and the southwest 11.

As to states, California with 31 reported and Pennsylvania with 25—and others in prospect—were at the top of the list.

Nowhere was the increase sharp—one or two cents a day, with monthly rates being advanced less than proportionately, being widely reported.
