Roseburg's smashing upset victory over the high-scoring Myrtle Point quintet here last Friday night made a mad scramble out of the conference hoop race, with Roseburg, Myrtle Point and North Bend all tied for first place at the end of the second week of the schedule.

The Indians' unexpected win made quite one thing, and that is the league this year is composed of teams of almost equal ability, and the race from here on in should be an exciting one. At this point it appears that Marshfield, with only one victory on the board, is the weakest member of the district, but they are proving with games that the Indians may make it plenty tough on the other members before they all come down the home stretch. The Red Devils of Coguille, after drawing a bye the opening week, are tempted to unhook their season with a conference win at North Bend last Friday evening, but were unceremoniously trounced by the Bulldogs, 36 to 26, in a very convincing manner.

As the teams enter the third lap of the race, closely bunched, the first unofficial scoring statistics are released. Roseburg, Myrtle Point and North Bend control all, with Roseburg leading with 16 points, and Coguille takes that. However, every team in the league but Coguille and Marshfield has played two games, so there should be a decided shift in positions when the results of this week's contests are made known.

Demented Toss Scorer.
Sam Bennett, Myrtle Point's tall guard center, by virtue of his scoring against Roseburg, is in first place with 23 points on 9 field goals and 5 foul conversions. Bernhard, North Bend guard, loomed in 6 field goals against Coguille the other night to sneak into second place with 17 points, one more than Ray Morgan, Roseburg's flashy forward, has been able to garner, who is third with 7 field goals and 2 charity tosses, for 16. Marion Stuck, last season's all-conference high-scoring forward, lags in fourth place with 14 points from 7 field goals. He has yet to break into the conference free throw scoring column. Ivan Hatfield, Roseburg's diminutive forward playing his first season, has fifth place clinched on 6 field goals and 1 foul shot for 13 points. Zeigler, North Bend's bulky center, is sixth with 12 points, followed by George Sanders, Roseburg guard, and Ray Cook, Myrtle Point guard, who are tied for seventh place with 11 points.

Neal, Roseburg, is in eighth place with 9 markers. Hudson, North Bend, and Rowell, Coguille, are tied for ninth place with 8 points each. Sanders, Roseburg; Sherman, Myrtle Point; and Knute, North Bend, are all tied for tenth position with 7 points.

Demented leads again in both number of field goals scored and foul shots converted with 9 and 5, respectively. Bernhard, North Bend, is second in putting field goals with 8. Sanders, Roseburg; Ray Cook, Myrtle Point; Neal, Roseburg, and Sprague, Myrtle Point, are tied for second in number of free tosses converted with 3 each.

SPOTLIGHTING OF DEER BRINGS FINES

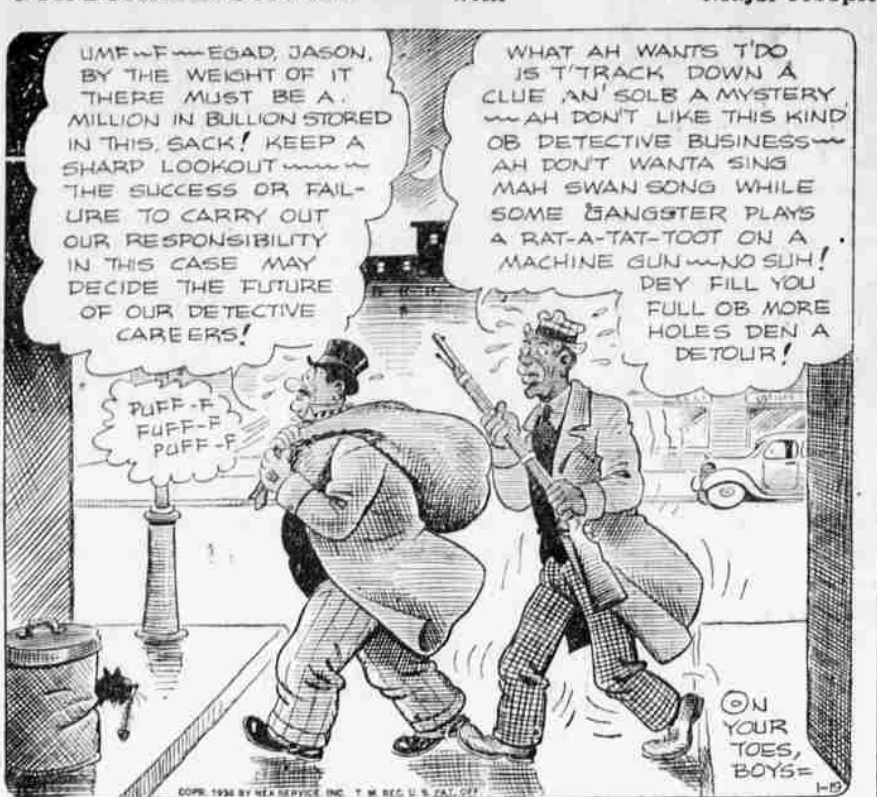

Immortals of Baseball are Joined By Grover Cleveland Alexander, Rated One Of Greatest Pitchers in History of Game

NEW YORK, Jan. 18.—(AP)—Baseball's solemnly elected immortal players today and yesterday joined the greatest pitcher in the history of the game, Grover Cleveland Alexander, who died last week.

"Old Pete," the great pitcher, who stood big league battens on their heads for 20 years, joins the select little group enshrined in the hall of fame at Cooperstown, N. Y., by a flattering vote of the Baseball Writers' Association of America.

Of 117 players of the past who received at least one vote in this year's poll, Alex was the only one to be named on the necessary 75 percent of the ballots. Needing 131 votes for election, he received 212.

Three other players were tied for short, George Sisler getting 179 votes, Wes White 177, and Eddie Collins, 175. Others who trailed Alexander included Rube Waddell, 144; Frank Chance, 133; Ed Delahanty, 132; Ed Walsh, 119; and Johnny Evers, 91.

Those whom Alexander joins in baseball's temple are Ty Cobb, Babe Ruth, Honus Wagner, Christy Mathewson, Walter Johnson, Eddie Collins, Fred Sparger and Cy Young, all named in past ball votes of the baseball writers as the game's outstanding players since 1900.

Alex, like many other old-timers, has long been remembered for his major league exploits with the Phillies in 1930. After pitching to five games for Dallas in the Texas League later that season, he finally left organized baseball at the age of 43, and since then has been named the country's other most popular baseball player, his own club now at Springfield, Ill.

Girls Dated for Roseburg Game Noted for Great Playing Skill.

Less than one week from tonight, on Tuesday, January 25, the "extra-special," "super extravaganza" basketball treat of the season will be offered once again, for on that evening Olson's Red Heads, the All-American and world's champion girls' basketball team, will return to Roseburg for another sensational basketball game against local rival players.

Olson's Red Heads are composed of seven attractive young ladies, all super hoop stars, who travel over the country meeting and all competition. This time, as they did last season, they will meet on the maple planks at senior high gym a team of former high school and college all-stars. Twice the Red Heads appeared here last winter, playing before crowds so large that even the "S. R. O." (Standing Room Only) signs were taken down, and twice the girls team went down to defeat by close scores.

So enthusiastic was the response of the paying customers to the excellent exhibition of basketball played by this famous team of traveling hoop artists that local officials were more than pleased to invite them back for another engagement.

Ability Unquestioned.
