

# FARR FAVORED TO DEFEAT BRADDOCK

### Welshman Has Advantages of Youth and Size for Tonight's Battle.

NEW YORK, Jan. 21. (AP)—The second big heavy-weight brawl of the indoor season takes place at the garden tonight, between Jim Braddock, the ex-champion, and Tommy Farr, the terrible Welshman, and it promises to be hot and heavy.

The garden virtually was a sell-out, with a gross of over \$90,000 predicted by Promoter Mike Jacobs. Last month's bout between Max Schmeling and Harry Thomas did only about \$75,000.

Farr, largely on the strength of having gone 15 rounds with Champion Joe Louis without becoming a total loss, remained a favorite in the heavy betting at odds of 8 to 5 and 7 to 5. He was a logical choice over his 32-year-old opponent, who lost his crown to Louis last summer by a knockout.

Jim's Only Chance Seen  
Braddock, though, didn't lack supporters. The pleasant Irishman, who came up from the relief line to win the title, still packs a punch, even if his legs aren't what they used to be. There were those who thought he might nail the Welshman some time during the 10 rounds, possibly with an uppercut.

That appeared to be Jim's only real chance. Farr, who was a terrific flop in training for his bout with Louis, has made an impression on the experts this time. He has brought himself into near perfect condition, and is a powerful fellow. He never will be a pretty boxer, like Braddock, and he hasn't much of a punch, but he is a bruising, busy fighter.

The expectation was that Farr would start climbing all over Braddock from the first bell, like he did against Louis, depending upon his iron jaw to withstand Jim's jabs and gambling that the veteran would wear the veteran down. He posed a tough test for Braddock, who has sworn to hang up the gloves if he's soundly beaten.

Louis, who watched Braddock box two days ago, thought Jim

looked good. So has everybody else, nearly. He has over a month of steady training behind him. His eyes are clear and his torso trim. The only thing nobody can tell

except Jim is the amount of spring left in his legs.

Welshman Bigger, Younger  
All the physical advantages, except for an inch and a half in height, were in Farr's favor. The Welshman was expected to weigh in at 204 pounds at noon today, with Braddock at 195. At 24, Farr had a pull of eight years over the former champion. He had the longer reach and was a bigger man through the chest and body.

Farr, whose self-esteem was sufficient to bet on himself to beat Louis, looks upon tonight's scrap only as a stepping stone to very big things, the first being a match with Max Baer in March. The idea that he might lose apparently hasn't entered his head.

Braddock, not a fellow to boast, said only: "I feel good and I'm ready for this chambrake to start. I'll be in there winging 'em."

# INDIANS TO BATTLE COQUILLE TONIGHT

### Local High Handicapped by Injuries, but Ready for Hot Hoop Game.

Roseburg's foe this evening at the senior high gymnasium, Coquille high school, may have been undisputed cellar champion at the close of the conference race last season, but from the 13-to-14 "waxing" they gave Tuesday night to North Bend high school—the team, incidentally, that beat the Indians 30 to 25 in the opening game of the season—the home town cagers are in for a plenty tough time. It seems the Red Devils have an entirely new slant on things and are out to make a lot of trouble here tonight when the Indians attempt to make the visitors their second victim in their third conference start.

Coquille's victory over the Bulldogs could easily be called an upset, perhaps, for only last Friday North Bend reversed things by defeating Coquille, 36 to 29, in a game that counts in the league standings. The Red Devils' win earlier this week was another one of those "kings-X" games which do not count. Needless to say this underdog triumph will make Coquille victory-hungry and they'll likely be putting everything they have into the old ball game in an effort to break into the win column for the first time this season by staging another upset in defeating Jim Watts' Indians.

Fuhrman Chief Threat  
Coach Hal Hutton will bring a squad of veteran players with five lettermen on his starting quintet. Probably the outstanding player on the squad is Ralph Fuhrman, an all-around man who plays both the forward and center positions. Against Hutton in an early season game, Fuhrman staged a one-man uprising by scoring 22 points. In his last game, teaming with his running mate, Bailey, forward each made 10 points. The two will likely cause many moments of uneasiness tonight.

The Indians tapered off a week of intensive workouts by polishing up a few of the dull spots in their offensive. The whole squad will likely be weakened somewhat by injuries and sickness to key-players. Lael Campbell, center, is still suffering from the effects of a bad cold; "Tub" Pemberton, reserve center, is limping around the gym with a lame back, so may not be ready to go tonight, and Pete Rutter, shiny guard, is still favoring a sprained ankle. However, despite these casualties, Coach Watts declares that the Indians will be out to do everything possible to annex their second conference win at the expense of the Coquille Red Devils.

# DIMAGGIO DICKERS ON SALARY INCREASE

NEW YORK, Jan. 21. (AP)—Joe Dimaggio, sensational New York Yankee outfielder, emerged from a conference with Owners Jacob Ruppert today on his 1938 salary with the announcement that no agreement had been reached. Dimaggio told baseball writers he had declined to reduce his demand, believed to be for \$30,000. Ruppert announced that he had boosted the Yankee offer to \$25,000 but that failed to satisfy the belling Joe.

The club's original offer, it was believed, was for \$18,000, an increase of \$3,000 over the salary Dimaggio was paid last year when he led both leagues in home runs, led the American league in runs scored and ranked second to Detroit's Hank Greenberg in runs batted in.

# DOOMED PAIR GETS ONE-WEEK RESPITE

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Jan. 20. (AP)—Acting Governor John Steele announced today he had reprieved for one week the executions of Mrs. Marie Porter and Angelo Ralph Giacomola, who were scheduled to die in the electric chair at Chester soon after midnight.

The lieutenant governor, acting as chief executive while Governor Horner is in Washington, said he granted the week's delay solely on the plea of Giacomola's mother.

Governor Horner yesterday refused to grant clemency to Giacomola and Mrs. Porter. If the execution is finally carried out, she will be the first woman legally electrocuted in Illinois and the first executed since 1845.

Saying he had the word of Giacomola's mother that additional evidence had been found, Steele said: "It is my belief that a short stay will do no harm in this case. I deeply feel for Giacomola's mother and want her to have every opportunity to produce evidence that

may help to save her boy's life. . . . "While I have no sympathy for either of these defendants, I do not believe it would be fair to deprive one and not the other."

# ACADEMIC MERITS PUT FIRST BY ERB

EUGENE, Jan. 20. (AP)—Students, faculty and townspeople gave Dr. Donald M. Erb, president-elect of the University of Oregon, a tremendous ovation when he appeared on the platform at Geringer hall this morning to make his first public appearance here since his appointment.

Speaking on the topic, "College Spirit," Dr. Erb stressed three things as important in this respect: Loyalty, based on honest belief and affection; pride, based on valid accomplishments, and distinction, the urge to make the best of every opportunity which finds its expression in the deeds of the students, faculty and alumni.

"Understand me," said Dr. Erb, "when I say that not even athletic prowess can be considered an essential. I believe in athletics. I enjoy sport. When the Oregon team plays Montana I shall be there and if things are going well I shall probably believe in a manner most un-presidential. I believe in a wholesome and general participation in sport and athletics and in a sound program of physical education, but all these things are incidental to those works which make for academic distinction."
