LUMBERMEN TOLD UPSWING NEARING

Prepare for Resumption of Home Building, Sponsor Drive, Greely Says.

TACOMA, Jan. 28.—(AP)—W. R. Greely today advised Pacific northwest lumbermen to become "minute men" in their own communities as a preparation for a building upturn sometime during 1938.

Greely, secretary-manager of the West Coast Lumbermen's association, declared in an address to the association convention: "Almost all economic prophets of the land agree that active resumption of home building will 'break' sometime in 1938. But this 'break' will not come like the steam callous and grand parade opening a circus. It will start with a little revival of confidence and the building of two or three houses in your own town. It will come from the grass roots of America. When the towns and farms make up their minds to do a little more building, and that little begins to mount like springs flowing together in a stream, we will start an upward spiral; first, in public thinking and confidence, then in demand for materials, then in employment. And economic recovery will be on its way."

Campaign Urged
Greely advised lumbermen they could best aid the beginning of such a recovery by actively sponsoring a "build now" campaign in each of their home towns, with the cooperation of bankers, editors and improvement groups. He suggested that each familiarize himself with federal housing administration activities so that he could explain them to laymen and that lumbermen cooperate with other building trades groups to construct demonstration homes.
"Congress is about to pass new legislation to promote low-cost homes," he continued. "The federal housing administration has again given the country fine, constructive leadership for mobilizing—not only the money—but the education, all powers of the government behind low-cost housing as the way out of the present business slump."

No War on New Deal
Greely warned lumbermen against expecting outside aid for their industry; and at the same time denied any intention by the lumber industry to "strike" against government policies.
"There has been much loose talk," he said, "about business trying to wreck the new deal, or business staging sit-down strikes. Anything of the sort is far from the mind of the west coast lumbermen. He is more apt to wreck himself by greater production and more employment than the market justifies."

Crisis in International Affairs Proves Boon to Career Diplomats of America

WASHINGTON.—The world crisis is giving Uncle Sam's career diplomats the biggest break they've had in years.
In the midst of the turmoil, the Roosevelt administration is turning more and more to experienced men who have made foreign affairs their life work.

This is not mere accident. The career men have shown their ability to take trouble in large doses, where the casual political appointees sometimes has not known how to stand the gaff.

In times past, political leaders, prominent men, and patronage seekers have regarded diplomatic posts as their particular fruit. Some such men proved to be corking good ambassadors, such as Benjamin Franklin, John Jay and Charles Francis Adams, but many have been stuffed shirts.

Backing up ambassadors and ministers who didn't know their international onions were the foreign service career men—consuls, secretaries, aides and the like. All of them were unknowns merely trying to make a living and doing a poor job of that when social demands got too heavy.

Merit Counts
Most of the career men rose to minor posts through sheer merit and knowledge of foreign affairs. And yet, the government offered them little incentive, because their jobs were constantly menaced by the patronage grabbers. Besides, the good posts always went to persons of political importance.

About 25 years ago congress decided to do something about all this, and passed a law protecting career men from the political whims of the party in power.

Then, in 1915, Democratic President Wilson gave the career men the welcome surprise of their lives when he appointed one of their number to the hot spot of the hour—Mexico City. Further than that,
