SET FOR BATTLE

Highly-Rated Eugene High to Be Foes of Indians Here Tonight.

Roseburg high school plays host tonight at senior high to the invading Golden Tide quintet from the University high school of Eugene in a contest in which every indication points to a "battle royal."

Coach Jim Watts' Indian hoopers are determined to turn the tables on Coach Ray Hendrickson's lads, thus avenging a stinging 35 to 13 defeat suffered at the hands of the visitors on the big floor of Eugene's McArthur court earlier this season. The undesired humiliation of defeat in Jim Watts' former stomping grounds plus the unwarranted reflections cast upon the Roseburg team in particular and basketball as played in this part of the state in general by Lane county sports commentators, is enough to put the whole squad in the right frame of mind to wreak dire results upon our unsuspecting visitors.

Though the local hoopers will again be dwarfed by the elongated cagers from the campus school, as they have been in practically every game played this year, some compensation will come from the fact that the Braves will be playing in their own tepee in familiar surroundings. No team met this season has outrun them, out-conditioned them; likewise, no team, big or little, has displayed any better ball-handling than that demonstrated by our own Indians.

Visitors Highly Rated
The team representing the Golden Tide this season is one of the strongest turned out in the past few years. They not only lead their own league without suffering a loss, but have overwhelmed their opponents in doing so. So far this season Coach Hendrickson's team has lost but one game and that to

EARL SNELL NAMED
TO SAFETY POST

Appointment of Oregon's Secretary of State Earl Snell to the chairmanship of the motor vehicle traffic safety committee of the western safety conference is announced in the February issue of the Oregon Motorist, scheduled to appear this week.

Mr. Snell, the Motorist points out, played an important part in the conference held last year in Portland, acting as discussion chairman at the meetings devoted to the study of street and highway hazards.

The magazine, which is the official publication of the Oregon State Motor association, was informed of Mr. Snell's appointment by Gerry H. Lockner, general chairman of the conference in Los Angeles. Lockner has picked only men outstanding in their respective safety fields to head the various safety groups.

"Snell has been active in Oregon's program to reduce street and highway hazards," the Motorist states. "He has built around him a competent staff of safety workers and drawn up a workable plan for the state as a whole."

The 1938 western safety conference will be held in Los Angeles, September 12 to 15.

HIGH WATER HITS
SUTHERLIN VALLEY

SUTHERLIN, Feb. 8.—High water caused its yearly excitement and damage in Sutherland Sunday. Rising rapidly throughout the day, it was at its highest level about noon. It did not exceed the mark of five years ago, however, the drain ditch having been widened and deepened since then. Floors of the John Cook and Paul Trozelle homes and the Theodore Anderson pool room were completely submerged for several hours. Water covered the east Sutherland roads in many places, the deepest being on the west side of the Arthur Smith mill. Many private bridges along the road were washed out and much grain land covered with water.

A pet cat belonging to John and Wayne Musgrove, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Musgrove, caused some excitement late Sunday evening. The small animal apparently became trapped beneath the Klondike club building and attracted the attention of the small owners by its pitiful cries. Boards were quickly pulled up and the kitten was found swimming vainly around in several feet of water, having been there most of the day. A warm stove, a dry towel and a pan of warm milk did much to restore "Missie Spike's" dignity, however.

HUSKIES, 59 TO 43

Cougar Basketeers Defeat Montana, Idaho Conquers Gonzaga Quintet.

EUGENE, Feb. 8.—(AP)—The Oregon Webfoots rallied to an easy win in the first half of their series with the University of Washington last night, outspeeding and outshooting the Huskies for a 59-43 victory.

The Oregonians completely dominated the floor in the first half, which ended 32-13. Laddie Gale leading an attack which kept the visitors on the defensive.

Roy Williamson, who entered the game midway of the second half, sparked the Huskies to an attack which had narrowed the gap to six points before the Webfoots again got the situation in hand.

Williamson's long baskets were good for 11 points, high for the Huskies. Sliver and Gale each scored 18 for Oregon.

The two teams meet again tonight.

PULLMAN, Feb. 8.—(AP)—Washington State college's Cougars pulled away after a close first half to defeat the Montana university basketball team, 59 to 37, here last night. They led 27 to 22 at halftime.

WALLA WALLA, Feb. 8.—(AP)—The Bearcats of Wallamette university staged a last minute, 6-point scoring rally to defeat their traditional rivals of Whitman college, 29 to 24, in a basketball game here last night.

After a see-saw battle, with a maximum spread of four points until the final basket, White of Wallamette broke a 23-23 deadlock with a field goal, Weaver followed, and two free throws finished the scoring.

SPOKANE, Feb. 8.—(AP)—The University of Idaho basketball team used but one regular player last night to defeat Gonzaga, 35 to 24, in a non-conference tilt.

The reserves, who won a previous victory over the Bulldogs this season, led, 18-10, at halftime.

Lyle Smith, guard, the only regular in suit, played two minutes as a substitute.

SUSPENSION HITS
THREE HOOP TEAMS

PORTLAND, Feb. 8.—(AP)—The suspension of the Southern Oregon Normal school, Signal Hill and Multnomah club basketball teams will stand, officials of the Oregon association of the A. A. U. said yesterday after Ray Smith, coach of the two independent teams, protested the ruling announced Saturday.

Daniel J. Forris, national secretary, said in a telegram to James Richardson of the state association that "while Southern Oregon Normal school is ineligible, it disqualifies all teams that it plays."

The Sons, winners in the state A. A. U. race last year, were entered in the tournament scheduled for Salem Feb. 24-26.

Their disbarment followed two games played against the bearded Invaders, a traveling team. Signal Hill and Multnomah club drew suspensions on the charge of playing outside the state without a permit.

GEHRIG HOLDING
OUT FOR \$40,000

NEW YORK, Feb. 8.—(AP)—"Larruph" Lou Gehrig, ironman first baseman of the New York Yankees, joined the world champions' fast growing holdout list today, rejecting owner Jake Ruppert's offer of \$36,000 again this year and demanding an increase of 15 per cent, or roughly, \$40,000.

Col. Ruppert, a bit irritated, told baseball writers he would stick by his offer of \$36,000 to Gehrig and \$25,000 to the other players, who are holding out for \$40,000.

"They won't get a cent more and that's final," said the colonel. "They can take it or leave it."
