

INDIANS BEATEN BY UNIVERSITY HIGH

Local Basketeers Display Jitters in First Half; Game Ends 42-27.

A demoralized and overwhelmed Indian basketball team, behind 28 to 6 at halftime, only to come back courageously in the final two periods to outfight and outscore their opponents, 21 to 13, found the easily led too much to overcome and went down to defeat, 42 to 27, at the hands of a tall and powerful University High school quintet from Eugene in a fast and tough non-conference game played last night at Senior high.

Decided underdogs as the game started and apparently suffering from a bad case of jitters which allowed the Golden Tiders' brilliant forward, to score on an unopposed setup on the opening tip-off play which found the Indians befuddled as to the direction in which they were going, University high took a lead from which they were never headed. A pass interception by Gard, and another easy basket, gave the visitors a four-point lead before the Indians knew the game had actually started.

From that point on until the rest period, it was Gard, then Bullion, connecting with the hoop with uncanny regularity, running up a 14-to-4 lead at the end of the first period. Only three minutes remained in the half when Neal, Indian guard, broke the jinx by sinking a long field goal for Roseburg's first basket, the half finally ending 28 to 6 for the campus five.

Rally Whittles Lead

It was an entirely different Indian team which came out for the final two periods. Fighting against odds of height and experience, the Indian quintet took command of the game at the outset to outplay University high for the remainder of the contest. Close checking and accurate shooting by the entire Indian team slowly whittled away at the lead, and with the third quarter ending 35-15, the Indians had carved 7 points off of the 22-point margin by the final whistle.

Gard, sharpshooting Eugene forward, took high point honors with 17, followed by Neal, Roseburg, with 12 points. Bullion, Gard's running mate, was runner-up for the Tiders with 11, and Hatfield took second position for Roseburg with 5 markers.

What Coach Jim Watts said to his players within the confines of the locker room during the rest period will probably never be known, but whatever it was, it worked wonders. The Indians came back on the floor radiating confidence and determination, and their play, showing a complete reversal of form, actually made University high look bad. More spirit and more fight displayed by the Braves last night than had been seen in some time and the courage with which they went after that discouraging lead changed an otherwise drab contest into a wild and exciting struggle.

What Figures Show

Being handicapped by such an overwhelming difference in height made it extremely easy for the Indians to commit fouls. Twenty-three infractions of the rules were charged against the locals to 10 for the visitors, with Campbell and Neal both taking an enforced rest late in the game. Records showed that Roseburg took 48 shots at the elusive hoop to bag 11 field goals for approximately 23 per cent accuracy, while University high netted 14 baskets out of 24 attempts for almost a 58 per cent rating.

The large margin of difference came in the fast shooting department, the Golden Tiders sinking 11 out of 27 free throws awarded, while the Indians converted 5 out of 13.

Coach Watts' Indians will swing into action again next Friday evening when they meet North Bend high school on the local court in what will probably be the crucial game of the Douglas-Cone district race. The Bulldogs lead the league at present, and the Indians must come out with a victory to stay in the running. North Bend defeated James 30 to 25, in the first game of the season at Coos Bay.

STEELE'S KAYO OF TURNER UNDER QUIZ

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Feb. 9.—(AP)—Brig. Gen. John H. Tholan, chairman of the New York state athletic commission, promised today an investigation of Middleweight Champion Freddie Steele's first-round knockout of Bob Turner last night.

Steele, favored the Newport News, Va., fighter four times in winning the battle in two minutes and 17 seconds of the first round. It had been scheduled as a 10-round overweight match. Steele weighed 158 and Turner 162, two pounds over the middleweight limit.

The champion put Turner on the floor three times before the knockout. Tholan, who saw the bout, said he had ordered Turner's purse withheld and that the commission would start an immediate investigation.

A crowd of 2,500 persons started booing when Turner hit the canvas the first time and kept up the din for almost 15 minutes. In his dressing room, Turner, who recently defeated Carmen Barth, said Steele's first right-hand punch dazed him.

BASEBALL CAREER OF SALKELD ENDED

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 9.—(AP)—The promising baseball career of Bill Salkeld, former San Francisco Seals catcher, is ended, insurance doctors admitted today.

He was stricken early in the 1936 season, shortly after he came to San Francisco from Sacramento Senators, when he injured his knee in an accident at third base. His right knee stiffened. After nearly two years of trying to get the joint into condition again, insurance doctors admitted they had failed, and Salkeld was paid a \$5,000 check yesterday as complete compensation.

ARMSTRONG WILL BATTLE CITRINO

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 9.—(AP)—Featherweight Champion Henry Armstrong, hard-boiled Los Angeles negro who has knocked out 39 of his 31 opponents, will look up for ten rounds tonight with Al Citrino, sturdy San Francisco veteran.

Armstrong's title will not be in stake in the bout. Both fighters will weigh in over the 126-pound limit.

LENGLET AND BRAY FIGHT SLOW DRAW

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 9.—(AP)—Andre Lenglet of France and Roy Bray of Los Angeles, two extra-size heavyweights, failed to settle the question of pugilistic supremacy here last night. They boxed 10 slow rounds to a draw.

Both resorted to clinching as Lenglet, then Bray, threw a barrage of blows.

The Frenchman, 206, caught the favor of ringsters with a fourth-round rally which did not damage the local negro, who weighed 210.

GALE HEADED FOR NEW HOOP RECORD

SEATTLE, Feb. 9.—(AP)—Hitting the hoop for an even 40 points against the Washington Huskies in the two-game series Monday and Tuesday nights at Eugene, Laddie Gale, Oregon's sharpshooter, was in easy striking distance today of the northern division Pacific coast conference basketball scoring record.

His total to date is 174 points for 12 games compared to the division record of 187 points for 16 games bag by Wally Palmberg, Oregon State, who has the schedule this season calls for 20 games a new mark in almost certain.

U. OF O. FIVE KEEPS CONFERENCE LEAD

Washington Beaten Third Straight, 56-53; Cougars Down Montana.

EUGENE, Feb. 9.—(AP)—The University of Oregon basketball squad marked up its third victory over the University of Washington and retained its northern division Pacific coast conference title lead last night by winning, 56 to 53.

Oregon eked out the close win by coming from behind in the last two minutes of play after halting down a healthy Washington lead.

In the first period, the lead changed 11 times, with Oregon ahead, 33 to 30, at the half.

In the second half, Oregon had trouble finding this basket and Washington piled up a nine-point lead. In the final four minutes of play, Oregon whittled at the margin with baskets in quick succession by Gale, Silver and Winter.

Pavalunas, sub guard, dropped a difficult howitzer shot to put Oregon one point ahead, 34 to 33, then Gale dropped a pair of free throws and clinched the lead.

Gale made 22 points to take high scoring honors.

PULLMAN, Wash., Feb. 9.—(AP)—Washington State's basketball quintet made a clean sweep of its two-game series against Montana here last night, taking the final game by a score of 56-30.

The Cougars went into the lead after 10 minutes of play and were never headed. The Grizzlies made their bid in the first half, the second being a matter of routine play for the Cougars.

The Cougars retained their second place position in the conference standings.

MASTER VIOLINIST DATED AT EUGENE



UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Feb. 8.—(Special)—Nathan Milstein, the "master violinist," will appear in concert in Eugene Sunday afternoon, February 13, under auspices of the association of students of the University of Oregon.

The 34-year-old Russian, favorite of American music critics, is now on his ninth tour of the United States. During that time he has appeared with 14 of the nation's leading symphony orchestras. ROOSEVELT EYEING NEW RELIEF PLEAS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—(AP)—President Roosevelt told a press conference today he was studying appeals for additional relief appropriations and probably would have an announcement to make in a few days.

Shortly before he had conferred on the subject with Secretary Morgenthau, Acting Budget Director Bell, and Acting Relief Director Williams.

They were asked to the white house after four mid-west mayors declared \$400,000,000 more was needed to pay an additional 1,000,000 persons on work relief.

In answer to questions, the president said the matter was not being approached from the point of view of pump priming, but from the standpoint of human needs.

The method of spending would be decided after it was found how much money was needed, he said. Asked about reports he was about to propose another "breath-taking spell" for business, the president noted the laughter that arose from the large crowd of newsmen and replied that provided the answer.

He also was asked whether he was considering another floodgate in the near future, replying he hoped not.

In reply to another inquiry regarding discussions of a future works program confined to self liquidating projects, the president said he had suggested to a group of congressmen yesterday it would be a good thing if states and localities would study such self liquidating projects. Projects of that classification, he said, would return relief money to the treasury.

He told another questioner, who had asked the prospects of permitting national banks to return to the business of underwriting securities, that in letters he had seen on the subject there had appeared no proposal which he believed would protect the public against the evils of other days.

PROPOSED LOAN TO PROP WOOL STUDIED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—(AP)—Senator Schwartz (D., Wyo.), said today he understood agriculture department officials, at the request of the president, were studying a proposal for a \$10,000,000 reconstruction, corporation loan to stabilize wool prices.

Schwartz said he thought the RFC, in response to a request by western congressmen and ranchers, had set up necessary machinery for the formation of a corporation to which the loan could be made.

He explained the RFC could not make loans to individual ranchers.

"Effect of the loan, the wool men believe, would be to strengthen the market and peg the price of wool, Boston delivery, at 84 cents a pound," Schwartz said.
