PIANO CONCERT IS GREATLY ENJOYED

The piano concert given on Tuesday evening by Henry Le Conte at the Baptist church was an unusual treat to music lovers of Roseburg and surrounding communities. Mr. Le Conte, pupil of Hans von Bülow, held the audience in rapt attention throughout the program, and spontaneous applause following each of the fine groups of compositions bespoke real appreciation of Mr. Le Conte's interpretations. The program was opened with the three movements of the beloved "Moonlight" sonata of Beethoven. Four universally enjoyed numbers by the "tone-poet" Chopin were next interpreted by Mr. Le Conte in a beautiful manner. Of the eight numbers following those of the early classics, perhaps "If I Were a Bird" by Handel, "Pastorale" by Gounod, and "Home, Sweet Home" by Thalberg, received the most appreciation. The difficult "La Campanella" by Paganini-Liszt was well interpreted by Mr. Le Conte as the finale on the program. Enthusiastic and prolonged applause by an audience which made no move to leave the concert room, showed true appreciation of the performance of this pianist, who has retained an admirable technique while in the latter years of life. His contributions regarding the numbers played and personal acquaintance with compositions added much to the program. Mr. Le Conte was generous in his commendation of the Baldwin grand piano used in the concert.

During an interlude in the piano program, J. M. Adams, local high school instructor, played a clarinet solo, accompanied by Miss Rosemary Larson, which was much enjoyed.

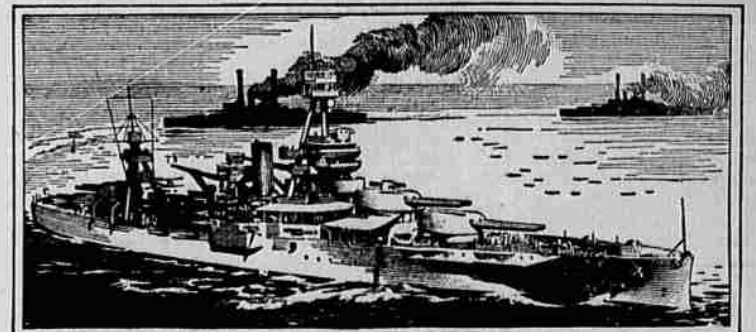
