PHOENIX, Ariz., Feb. 11.—(AP)—G. W. Siewert, 38, ranch worker, charged with the murder of Robert McMahon, Gold Hill, Ore., testified in his own behalf yesterday that McMahon charged at him as if to attack with a butcher knife. Siewert testified he pushed McMahon, who fell against a post. The state charged Siewert killed the Oregonian with a hammer in a fight over a bottle of wine in Siewert's cabin near Chandler, Ariz., last December 27.

OREGON DRIVE FOR ORCHESTRA PLANNED

PORTLAND, Feb. 11.—A statewide drive to raise \$25,000 for benefit of the Portland symphony orchestra will be sponsored by members of the Oregon Music Teachers' association, Portland district.

Music lovers would donate one dollar each. The Portland symphony society recently said sponsorship of the orchestra would be suspended after the present season because of a \$27,000 deficit.
