JACKSON DEFENDS POLICY IN TRIALS

Nominee Admits Trying To Pick "Friendly Judges, Favorable Forum."

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—(AP)—Robert H. Jackson, President Roosevelt's nominee for solicitor general, told a senate committee today that he always tried to "pick a friendly judge and a favorable forum" in the trial of federal anti-trust cases.

Jackson, now an assistant attorney general, defended policies of the department of justice anti-trust division which he heads and which was attacked by Senator Austin, (R., VI.)

Senator Norrie (Ind., Neb.), member of the judiciary subcommittee considering Jackson's nomination, came to the defense of the nominee.

"What's wrong with picking a favorable forum?" he demanded after Senator Austin had questioned Jackson at length on that point. "Doesn't the other side do it?"

"I would always pick a friendly judge if I could find one and a favorable forum where that is possible," replied Jackson.

"Of course you would," Norrie approved. "You would be derelict in your duty as a public official if you purposely chose an unfriendly forum."

Court Choice Not His

Austin questioned Jackson about the choice of the Madison, Wis., federal court for bringing to trial anti-trust cases against oil companies. The assistant attorney general said he had nothing to do with the selection of that court for the trial since the indictments had been returned before he became head of the anti-trust division.

He added, however, he thought it was a good choice.

"Do you approve of the department of justice having this means of power in its hands—the power of selecting the court where it will try its cases?" Austin asked.

"Certainly," replied Jackson. "Somebody's got to pick the court and I certainly wouldn't let the defendant do it."

Austin said he favored the "traditional policy that a man shall have a fair trial by his neighbors."

He said that it was "abhorrent" to him that a Vermont might be tried in Texas for an alleged anti-trust violation.

"Do you approve of that?" he asked.

"Yes sir," replied Jackson, smiling.

"Congress, not I, has prescribed that you may choose the jurisdiction. I am not to blame for the laws of congress. If I were rewriting the anti-trust laws, they would be changed considerably."

G. O. P. Platform Quoted

He explained that both a Vermont and a Texas might be charged in connection with an alleged anti-trust conspiracy and that jurisdiction would lie where the conspiracy was hatched.

Austin asked Jackson if it was his practice to pick "new deal" forums for trial of the cases.

"No, sir," the witness replied. "The anti-trust laws are not what I call new deal laws. They have
