

## LOUIS SHOWS NO PEP IN TRAINING

Champion Doesn't Consider Mann Dangerous; Easy Mark for Partners.

NEW YORK, Feb. 16.—(AP)—Joe Louis, the heavyweight champion, looks licker and easier to hit than a bear filled with honey as he nears the end of his training for next Wednesday night's title defense against Natie Mann, the chubby New Englander, at Madison Square garden.

Joe obviously isn't taking the 15-round encounter too seriously. He has been working only every other day and all his sparring partners still are sound of wind and limb, which is unusual around a Louis camp. He will put on the big gloves only twice more, tomorrow and Saturday, before climbing through the ropes.

All of which is somewhat mystifying, because Mann doesn't look like a soft touch and his record reads well. He's an earnest young man with rugged qualities, and he has been hitting the living day-lights out of some top-notch sparring mates. He honestly thinks he's going to lift the crown.

**Easy Mark for Partners**  
Still, when we watched Louis tumble around yesterday and get nailed with several smoking rights by a Canadian named Jack Toback, the man on the right said: "Don't go wrong on this one, Louis will stop Mann inside four."

Louis must be a lot more dangerous than he looks right now, or even than he looked against Tommy Farr last summer. His explanation of that one is, of course, that he caved in two knuckles on his right hand in an early round. But that doesn't explain his getting punched around by a couple of \$20-a-day day pigeons, like he was yesterday.

**Still Wide Open Mark**  
For all his painful experiences with Max Schmeling and Farr, the 23-year-old champion still lays himself wide open when he misses a left hook. He really shook him with a couple of right crosses, the kind that Mann is drilling on. Old Jack Blackburn, Joe's manager, looked unhappy, but Joe seemed unworried. Some one told him Mann never had fought more than 10 rounds before.

"That so?" said the big negro. "Well, I'll help him keep his record clean."  
Which indicates the extent to which Louis has grown up, even if he hadn't let his new whiskers grow wild for the last couple of weeks to prove it. He can wear crack pretty well now and his face has somehow lost that bland, innocent look. It's harder, more confident, the face of a fighting man.

**Never Saw Mann Fight**  
Joe never has seen Mann fight. All he knows about Natie is that he gave Bob Pastor a good kicking, along with some other good young heavyweights, and that the New Haven boy has a reputation for forcing a fight.

"That's good, I hope he does that," said Joe. "You know, I'm glad to fight him now, because I know he is about next to Smellin' in a way. He's whipped the young ones and it isn't just Smellin' he would have a good challenge."

**SHERIFF ACCUSED OF TAX "RAKE OFF"**  
OREGON CITY, Feb. 15.—(AP)—Dave Palmblad, former chief deputy tax collector for Clackamas county who was convicted for the theft of public funds, testified today that Sheriff E. T. Mass received \$100 and \$50 from a canvasser kept in the tax collector's office.

Palmblad, brought here from the state penitentiary, was the first prosecution witness in Mass' trial on an indictment charging larceny of public funds.

Palmblad testified that he, Sheriff Mass and Jessie Paddeck, a deputy, collected 50 cents on each delinquent tax certificate and placed the funds in the bag. He alleged that Deputy Paddeck, who will be tried later, took \$100. His own portion was \$75, he said.

Special Prosecutor F. T. Wade said the state would attempt to prove that the sheriff converted at least \$200 of funds collected from the sale of delinquent tax certificates to his own use and that he and his deputies, Jessie Paddeck and Palmblad, used the balance of \$1272 collected over an 11-year period to make up shortages in other tax funds.

Two other indictments accused the sheriff of larceny of \$11,000 and larceny with his son, Howard, of \$600. The son also awaits trial.

The defense confined its opening statement yesterday to an assertion of innocence.

The jury was composed of seven farmers, a retired state highway inspector and four housewives.

## OF O. HOOPSTERS TUMBLE TO THIRD

Washington State Victor 44 to 37; Oregon State Loses to Huskies.

PULLMAN, Wash., Feb. 16.—(AP)—The University of Oregon fell into third place in the northern division Pacific coast conference basketball title race last night when its squad was defeated 44 to 37 by Washington State.

The Cougars and the University of Idaho emerged tied for first, with nine wins and five losses each. Oregon was a fraction of a game behind, after regaining the lead from Idaho the night before by beating the Cougars 44 to 34.

The Cougars dropped a slow offensive and outran Oregon, previously considered tops at fast breaking.

The game was tied three times in the first six minutes before the Cougars took a 14-17 lead midway in the first half. Oregon rallied to within one point, 13-14, but Washington State led, 20 to 14, at the half.

**Gale Sets Record.**  
Laddie Gale of Oregon scored nine points to become the first northern division player ever to pass the 200-mark in a season. He previously broke the old mark of 187 points.

Wally Johnson, Oregon, and Al Hooper, Cougar, scored scoring honors with 12 points each.

The game ended in a disastrous road trip for Oregon, in which two games were lost to Idaho and one to Washington State of four played.

SEATTLE, Feb. 16.—(AP)—Washington defeated Oregon State last night, 40 to 30, to make it two straight and return to a contender position in the northern division Pacific coast conference title race.

The Huskies took the lead after the first ten minutes and remained in constant command. The halftime score was 26-17 for Washington.

Oregon State's closest threat in the second half lacked five points of tying Washington.

The victory gave Washington nine wins and seven losses, a home away from first place, held by Idaho at Washington State. Washington beat Oregon State in the first game of the series, 39 to 27.

## ETIQUETTE RULES REVISED AT O.S.C.

Emily Post's Guide Fails to Meet Requirements of College Folk.

CORVALLIS, Feb. 15.—(AP)—Emily Post's guide to etiquette is undergoing some streamlining at Oregon State college by co-eds who think the famous authority on how to "get 'em"—to your mouth—has gracefully overlooked a few points.

After a little more research, the co-eds are going to get out their own booklet on etiquette for college folks but for the present, says attractive Janet Hinkle, junior from Portland, these are a few of the changes advocated:

"Emily Post wrote her rules for general conditions and some of them just don't work when applied to groups such as fraternities, sororities and halls. For instance, she says that every one seated at a table should rise when an older person or couple comes in to be seated. Just imagine the uproar if we did that at a dining table where 40 or 50 students were seated."

"Under our rules, only the ones directly on either side of where the newcomers are to be seated rise from their seats."

"Then Emily says that when a boy assists a girl to be seated at the table she may go in from either side of her chair but we specify the left side in order to avoid confusion and possibly barked shins when a long line of diners is being seated on the same side of a table."

"The Emily Post rules say a hostess should never lead the way to the table, but in our sororities and halls the hostess or house-mother is the logical one to lead in, even ahead of honored guests, so that is the way we are going to do it."

So popular has the idea become that co-eds have formed etiquette committees that put on demonstrations in campus houses and halls, teams of two or three girls accepting dinner invitations and conducting "etiquette schools."

The committees go in for table practices, how to hold a partner at a dance, introductions properly done, being nice to chaperons, even opening doors for the date. Miss Hinkle says the general committee asks the boys what they think works best, then the girls and when we find general agreement on some practice it goes into our rules."

Asked how a girl should thank a boy for a date, she said the committee hadn't gone into much detail—"one should leave a few things to individual initiative!"
