SALES BY OREGON BAKERIES INCREASE

SALEM, Feb. 17.—(AP)—The Oregon baking industry had gross sales of \$9,137,671 last year, a six per cent increase over 1936, the state baker board said today.

License fees totaled 16,373. The board took credit for the increase in the baking business.

Increased wages, shorter hours and higher commodity prices resulted in increasing operating costs of some bakers by 40 per cent. More than 2,000 workers in the state's baking industry receive an average wage of \$1 an hour.

THE DALLES, Feb. 17.—(AP)—A letter from Senator Charles McNary reported the federal bureau of fisheries was not opposed to establishing salmon hatcheries on the Columbia river above Bonneville dam, W.
