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GOLD CERTIFICATES' BASIC VALUE GIVEN

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—(AP)—Gold certificates which the treasury will spend under modification of its gold "sterilization" policy will be issued on the basis of a gold value of \$35 per ounce, officials said today.

This is both the legal monetary value and cost price of gold to the treasury. Gold differs in this respect from silver, which has a legal value of \$1.29 per ounce, a price of \$4.64 cents an ounce when newly mined from American mines, and an international value of about 45 cents. The treasury issues silver certificates in the amount of the silver's cost—not its legal value. Silver certificates circulate among the public, but only the 12 federal reserve banks are permitted to hold gold certificates. The treasury announced Monday the first \$100,000,000 of gold it acquires in each quarter of this year will not be sterilized. Instead, gold certificates will be issued. Under the sterilization program in effect since Dec. 24, 1935, and intended to prevent credit inflation, the treasury held its gold purchases in an "inactive" fund rather than issuing certificates representing its value.

MOTOR CARRIERS' REVENUE MOUNTS

SALEM, Feb. 17.—(AP)—Freight and passenger motor carriers in Oregon had gross revenues of \$4,903,184 last year, paying \$1,094,249 in fees to the public utilities commissioner and traveling 65,898,952 miles. The motor transportation division of the public utilities commissioner's department had net revenues of \$859,818 last year, compared with \$821,439 in 1936 and \$850,478 in 1935. There were 10,427 for hire passenger and freight vehicles operating last year.

The total road mileage maintained included 1,793 miles of forest highways and 63,564 miles of truck trails. Construction was completed on 3,747 miles of national forest roads and on 1,403 miles of horse and foot trails. The road construction included 285 miles of forest highways and 3,482 miles of truck trails.

REWARD OFFERED IN STUDENT SLAYING

PORTLAND, Feb. 17.—(AP)—Friends of James Conners, Oregon State college student who was killed during the 1934 longshoremen's strike, have offered \$1000 for the conviction of persons involved in the slaying. Mayor Joseph K. Carson revealed today. The mayor said the case had been reopened because of the police roundup of alleged labor vandals. A bullet hit Conners when striking longshoremen attacked dock workers at a hiring hall. He had obtained summer employment to pay for his college course. Twenty-eight men were arrested on murder charges but none was convicted.

OREGON FARMERS FIGHT TRADE PACT

SALEM, Feb. 18.—(AP)—Oregon farmers, who organized here this week to fight labor racketeering, also are girding themselves for a battle against Secretary of State Hull's proposed reciprocal trade agreement with the United Kingdom. Representatives of wool, poultry, dairy, livestock and other agricultural interests met with Governor Martin to begin a campaign against provisions of the proposed treaty lowering tariff barriers on British products, which would compete with Oregon grown products, such as berries, barley and oat products, cut flowers, flax fiber, forage and vegetable seeds, wool products and rye grasses.

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"In many cases, it would mean the bankruptcy of several important major industries with its subsequent unemployment, and loss of markets and purchasing power," the governor said.
