FATALITY ABSENCE SETS OREGON MARK

SALEM, Feb. 18.—(AP)—This was the 18th consecutive day without a traffic fatality in Oregon, Secretary of State Snell reported.

"The significance of this record is apparent when we recall that during the past two years traffic deaths in Oregon have averaged almost one per day," Snell said. "We have checked all our available records since January 1, 1934, and never until this January has a single week passed without at least one fatality."

Snell said Oregon drivers should be proud of their conduct during the past two and one half weeks, especially in view of storms and slides in the southwestern part of the state.

Oregon ranked 16th among the 48 states of the union for the standpoint of low motor vehicle death rate in terms of highway mileage last year, Snell announced today.

Oregon's rate was 15.9 deaths per 100,000,000 vehicle miles, which means that one person was killed for each seven million miles traveled. The 1936 rate was 15.2 deaths per 100,000,000 vehicle miles. Oregon's death rate decreased 9 per cent in 1937.

The state of Rhode Island had the lowest death rate, 7.9 miles per 100,000,000 vehicle miles. Alabama was highest with a rate of 21.6.

Oregon also was one of 21 states which succeeded in reducing their fatalities in 1937 below the 1936 figure, Snell said.
