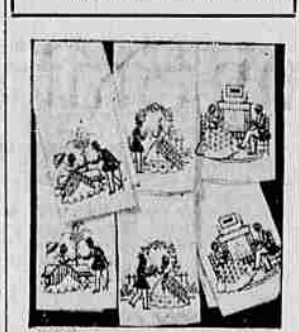
COUNTRY CLUB LADIES TO MEET ON THURSDAY

SENATE REJECTS RELIEF SUM BOOST

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The Frazier-Landis law forbids, in certain instances, foreclosures on farm mortgages for a three-year period. Farmers taking advantage of the act are required to pay creditors "rent" determined by federal courts.

Tax Bill Up To House — House passage of a tax revision bill by which it became the goal today of the house ways and means committee, which tentatively has approved the bulky measure.

Members said they hoped to bring the bill before the house early next week. A 15-to-10 vote against eliminating a special surtax on family-owned or closely-held corporations paved the way for committee agreement on the legislation yesterday.

Several amendments already approved involved the levy on closely-held corporations. The changes were designed to meet criticism that the tax, in seeking to penalize firms that might be used for tax avoidance, would hurt legitimate business enterprises.

Corporations having net incomes up to \$75,000 would be exempted. Revenue Not Slashed — The amendments written into the bill, Chairman Vinson said, should not lower government revenue below the amount now received.

One change adopted yesterday would cut from 3 to 1 cent per \$100 the tax on commodity futures and eliminate the exemption now granted "scratch sales."

Another, which Vinson said should encourage liquidation of personal holding companies, would grant taxpayers in hardship cases up to five years in which to pay the levy on gains realized in complete liquidation of such concerns.

Two major features of the bill — provisions easing the undistributed profits and capital gains taxes — received committee approval last week. All the provisions are retroactive to last January 1.

VERDICT AWARDS MONEY ON CLAIM

A verdict for \$1,642.60, the full amount asked in the complaint, was returned by a circuit court jury here last night after hearing the case of the Douglas Creditors' association against A. R. Andrews.

The trial was the first to be heard at the regular February term of court.
