BRIDGE PARTY IS CHARMING AFFAIR

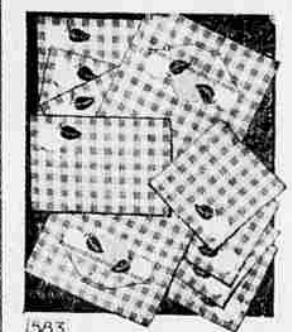

PRITCHETT MUST LEAVE U. S. FEB. 28

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—(AP)—Harold Pritchett, Vancouver, B. C., president of the International Woodworkers of America, a CIO affiliate, must leave the United States by February 28, the date on which his temporary visa expires, state department officials said last night.

Pritchett, who left Seattle last Monday, was understood to be on his way here to make a personal appeal before the department.

The Pacific northwest labor leader was denied a request for a new visa by the American consul at Vancouver recently.

A state department spokesman said the consul had found Pritchett was not admissible under the laws governing the entrance of foreigners. The consul decided Pritchett was ineligible under the laws permitting residence in this country, he said.

Pritchett had contended his union has members both in the United States and Canada and it was necessary he spend a large part of his time in the United States. He had had extensions of his visitor's permit.

CRAZY CON KILLS GUARD AT FOLSOM

FOLSOM, Calif., Feb. 24.—(AP)—Willard Johnston, a prison guard, was fatally injured and Charles H. McKnight, a convict, sustained a fractured skull from blows of a "stir crazy" convict here today.

Warden Clyde L. Plummer said the assailant was Robert Sterling, 31-year-old negro serving a life sentence for murder in the first degree.

Sterling was subdued after he was shot in the left shoulder by Guard A. C. Derrington. Plummer who went into the lower yard to investigate the disturbance said the fight took place in the prison stone yard and broke without warning or any apparent provocation.

The negro he said, was not regarded as of normal mind but had not been rated sufficiently abnormal mentally to be considered insane or kept in close confinement.
