Paris' Signs Read: "Curves Ahead"

Springtime Fashions Dramatize Feminine Figures



EMPRESS JOSEPHINE, the romantic figures of the famed painter Winterhalter, and the war in Spain inspire some of the creations in the spring collections of Paris couturiers. The hourglass silhouette, siren sheaths, daring necklines, floating panels, dramatic dinner hats with removable brims, extremely short jackets, extremely long ones, undetermined waistlines, longer bodices—these are other important new trends.

(By Cable to NEA Service and News-Review.) PARIS, Feb. 26.—Fashions that glorify and dramatize the feminine form are the big news in spring collections.

Curves take the spotlight. Waistlines, bosoms and hips are emphasized. The hourglass figure is more than a rumor—it's the silhouette of the moment, especially for evening, with the great houses of Chanel and Patou highlighting it most strongly.

The sex-appeal motif prevails throughout all collections. Lelong makes a spectacular evening gown of pink lace with bust cups the only lining for the bodice. Worth shows a feather brassiere. Chanel uses 1870 decolletes—ultra nude. Patou tops immense, swaying, vaporous evening skirts with faille bodices that lace at the sides, leaving backs quite bare.

Corset bodices in all collections are occasional, reminding one of the old whalebone affairs which ladies managed to get into only after much struggle with the bodice.

As always the influence of current headlines is prevalent. Molyneux shows a Spanish bolero and fringed-trimmed Spanish sailor. There are Chinese effects, of course. Also quantities of items obviously inspired by the floyd exhibition—for example, Bruyere's black lace gown with white lace mantilla. Youthful no ends are shoulder collars, head capes, narrow ribbon aches in Chinese porcelain shades. Winterhalter effects include a crinoline wedding dress with bouquets of lily of the valley on the skirt.

Second Empire trends are prevalent throughout all collections. These are expressed in wide skirts, slender waistlines, drop shoulders, in rich fabrics, such as laces, rustling taffetas, stiff satins, moires, and in delicate embroidery, ribbons, lace mitts.

Second in importance to the Second Empire silhouette is the sheathlike, siren one, with slit skirt, halter neckline which leaves the back stark naked, cabochon embroidery or gold or silver paillettes.

Mainbocher introduces "sound element"—tinkling embroidery on gowns, tiny bells on head-dresses. Chiffon gowns with flowing skirts, over flared, flared sheaths, have high, high necklines, covered shoulders. Besides the Winterhalter silhouette, Molyneux shows bias-cut gowns—beltless, with seams and hemlines outlined in sequins. Also "don't dress for dinner" creations with heart-shaped or square decolletes, short sleeves. With these, there are evening hats with removable brims. Men who
