Tribute Paid at Tree Dedication Rites To Late Mrs. Caroline Willis, Roseburg Pioneer and Promoter of Floriculture

The important contributions of Mrs. W. R. (Caroline Haines) Willis in the floral and arboreal field during her many years of residence in Roseburg were recalled by Mrs. George R. Child of San Francisco, in an article prepared for the memorial presentation at the Roseburg junior high school Tuesday.

Mrs. Child was the donor of a memorial plaque affixed Tuesday, Washington's birthday, to a tree on the junior high grounds. The tree, grown from a seed from the Washington home at Mt. Vernon, was dedicated in memory of Mrs. Willis.

The following article, written by Mrs. Child, was read at the dedicatory ceremony by Mrs. C. E. Roberts:

Almost a hundred years ago, in 1845, there was born in Paris, Ill., a little girl, christened Caroline Haines. When she was sixteen or seventeen years old her family came across the plains and mountains in a covered wagon to Oregon. She used to tell us how she always loved flowers and, therefore, how much she enjoyed this long slow journey. The start was made in the spring, when the wild flowers were beginning to bloom and, lasted six months, till the travellers reached Scottsburg. She said "it was my great delight in seeing and studying new wild flowers. I walked almost all the way from Illinois to Oregon." She soon began teaching school at Elkton, and then in a few years she married Judge Wm. R. Willis, who lived in Roseburg.

The house directly across the street from this school house front door was their first home. You can be sure she made a lovely garden there. In a few more years her husband's success permitted them to build the large new house on the corner of Cass and Rose streets. In spite of her growing family—three daughters and one son—despite busy brain and hands, she found time for her garden, for she said "We human beings always find time to do the things we love to do."

Home Now Public Library. This house, after her husband's death, Mrs. Willis sold, and it was moved around on Rose street and is now the public library which all of you enjoy. Many of the beautiful trees she had grown naturally had to be sacrificed in the moving of a large house, but those that still remain are for all of us to love and preserve. Her love included all growing things. She brought in shrubs, ferns and lilacs from the woods. She was among the first to raise strawberries for her own table, 20 years before others realized that

Roseburg could and should be a strawberry center.

Hon. Binger Hermann, of Roseburg, a former Oregon representative at Washington, D. C., sent her many strange seeds, for he knew she could and would raise them and that her report upon them would be trustworthy. Her little greenhouse produced many beautiful things, and there is many a friend living to whom the scent of a tuberose brings back the memory of the many tuberose Mrs. Willis was so generous with. In making things grow, Mrs. Willis had—no! luck—she had love and what is so poetically called "the blessed hand."

Enthusiast Others. Her enthusiasm and success in tree planting awakened a like enthusiasm in other garden lovers and she gave them many seedlings from her own raising. See to what height and beauty have grown the trees around the Bitter home. When the great Episcopal cathedral at Washington, D. C., was being built, the call went forth to garden lovers to send something to plant in the Cathedral garden. Mrs. Willis sent roots of the tall wild Oregon fern, the Woodwardia, and bulbs of the so-called Washington lily, with photographs and descriptions of their size and coloring. When this writer several years later visited that cathedral garden, those plants were there and carefully cherished and brought in to the glass house during the cold winters, but the garden superintendent asked me if in all truth "did those plants reach that size in Oregon?"

Mrs. Willis had many other interests. Hers was always an artistic nature. Some of us used to think she wore the most becoming and best looking clothes. Her cooking was outstanding—her luncheons and dinners were always unrivalled. Old China Sam would have told you how much he learned from her when he was in her service. When I came to know her, circumstances had become quite straightened and she did all her own cooking and almost all the gardening.

Notables Her Guests. Mrs. Willis loved to entertain, and her guests, whether her neighbors or those of position from afar, enjoyed her hospitality and sang her praises. She entertained among her guests, governors of Oregon, members of the state legislature, superior and supreme judges, Oregon's congressmen, and—as a fitting climax—President and Mrs. Rutherford B. Hayes and three other couples of the president's party in 1880. The railroad between California and Oregon was not completed when President and Mrs.

Life brought its share of sorrow to Mrs. Willis—her only son was killed in a railroad crash while on duty.

One more characteristic of Mrs. Willis which seems still more appropriate to dwell upon today is loyalty. She was loyal to her friends, to her city, to her state, to her country. And for this loyalty this last beautiful tribute was paid her by her church. On Easter Sunday after her death in 1931, loving friends had filled her pew with flowers.
