UPKEEP OF INDIANS ENTAILS HUGE SUM

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—(AP)—All the Indians in the United States—about 330,000—will cost the federal government a little over \$100 each, or about \$33,707,676, during the 1938-1939 fiscal year.

Appropriation of \$31,707,676 from the general treasury and a distribution of \$1,504,000 of tribal funds was authorized for all the tribesmen by the budget bureau, according to a published report of hearings by a house appropriations subcommittee on the interior department supply bill.

The Indian service estimated federal emergency agencies would spend an additional \$7,000,000 on Indian projects.

Major proposed appropriations for specific Indian bureau projects included:

Payment of proceeds from Coos Bay wagon road lands, \$30,000; from Oregon & California and Coos Bay wagon road grant lands, \$125,000.

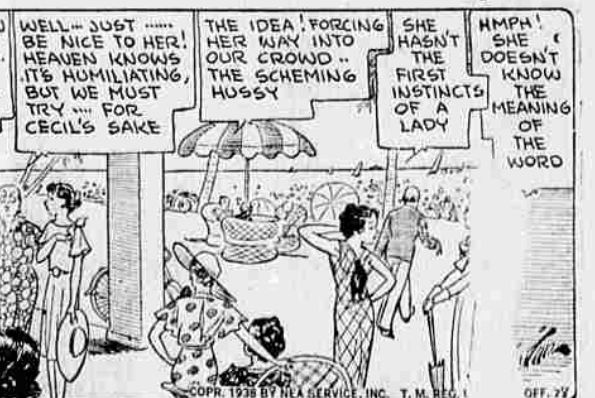
