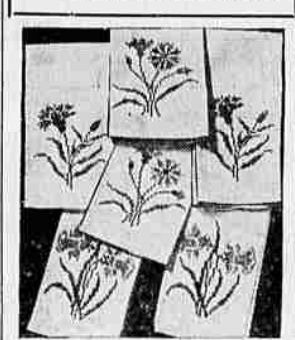
EPISCOPAL GUILD TO MEET NEXT MONDAY

SALVATION ARMY'S BUDGET APPROVED

Plans of organization for the forthcoming annual financial campaign of the Salvation Army were formulated last night at a meeting of the advisory board at the chamber of commerce. Glenn Owen presided as acting chairman.

Captain Henry H. Koerner, of the Portland divisional headquarters, presented the budget of the local unit, which was approved by the board. The budget totals \$3075, covering all income and expense, of which \$1800 is the quota of the public appeal.

F. L. Crittenden, advisory board treasurer, discussed the financial needs of the Roseburg post, stating sufficient money was never secured, and the officers were thereby severely handicapped in their activities. W. C. Harding emphasized the importance of the army receiving sufficient support to take care of the transient problem of the city, stating "a hungry man is a dangerous man."

A report of activities from March 1, 1937, to March 1, 1938, was rendered by Lieutenant Marie E. Lorenzen, officer in charge. This showed 156 senior meetings conducted, with an attendance of 3606. 76 children's and young people's educational classes and services with 951 attending, 899 hours spent in personal visitation of 372 families, 4375 publications sold and distributed. Relief and welfare work showed 191 families helped with food and clothing, 617 transients given aid, 564 garments and shoes distributed. Total number of people assisted totaled 1505.

General campaign chairman and the selection of committee members will be selected and announced later, stated Captain Koerner.

Board members attending included Crittenden, Harding, Owen, Harris Ellsworth and Leon McClintock.
