A report from the home care of six girls and five babies from Douglas county for 1163 days at a cost of \$988, of which the state paid \$257.12, leaving a net expense of \$730.88, which was borne by the institution.

"This is a work," said Dr. Wainwright, "which can be little publicized, and yet is a general part of the Army's activities. We recognize it as one of the most humanitarian activities, and the people of this county wish to enable the Army to carry on this work."

Dr. Wainwright is meeting today with his campaign cabinet to decide on the final organization details of the appeal, which opens Wednesday.

Yesterday was Salvation Army day in the churches, with the ministers referring to the work of the organization. At the First Baptist church, Captain Koerner spoke of the Army's work, and Lieutenant Lorenzen was the soloist of the morning.

Local Sportsmen Plan to Boost Umpqua River's Pastime Values.

A salmon fishing derby, planned to promote greater interest in the recreational resources of the Umpqua river and its tributaries, was given preliminary consideration at a meeting of interested sportsmen at Powell's Hardware Co. store Saturday night. An organization was formed, with Paul Dempsey as chairman and Earl Powell as secretary-treasurer.

It was decided that a registration fee of \$1 would be charged, to be paid at any time during the period of the derby, but registration must be made 24 hours before a fish may be weighed in and made eligible for prizes.

Women are to compete on an equal basis with men, it was announced.

Rules Outlined — Fish to be eligible for a prize must be caught on hook and line. Not marked fish will be accepted only when accompanied with ample proof that they were taken on hook and line. Commercial fishermen and licensed guides will not be eligible to enter.

Fish entered in the derby, it was stated, must be caught between the Umpqua bridge and the confluence of the north and south tributaries of the Umpqua.

Prizes To Be Posted — The organization proposes to post a large number of prizes to be distributed during the season. Registration fees and donations will be used to meet the cost of prizes. There will be no solicitation from business houses, it was stated, but voluntary contributions will be accepted from those desiring to aid in making the derby a success.

A meeting of all persons interested will be held at the Powell store Saturday, March 12, at 7 p. m., and Mr. Dempsey urges attendance of all sportsmen. At that time the rules will be definitely adopted, dates for the derby established, and three judges named to settle any and all questions which may arise.

"This derby is being promoted purely as an advertising event," Mr. Dempsey said. "Widespread attention has been attracted by similar contests on other streams of the state, and an annual Umpqua salmon derby should serve to attract a great many sportsmen to Roseburg and other communities during the salmon season."

STREAM CLEANSING BILL TITLE GIVEN

SALEM, March 7.—(AP)—Ballot title for the Oregon stream purification league's initiative to prevent pollution of the state's streams and lakes was prepared today by Attorney General Van Winkle, paying the way for distribution of petitions to obtain 20,000 signatures of registered voters to give the measure a place in the November ballot.

The bill would create a six-member state sanitary authority within the state board of health. The authority would approve or reject plans for new sewer systems and treatment of sewage and waste, as well as make rule to control pollution of waters.
