

NEW BOYCOTT PERIL FACED BY LUMBER

PORTLAND, March 10.—(AP)—The CIO International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's union, local No. 1-10, voted yesterday to "seriously consider" a boycott of "AFL-produced lumber unless an AFL boycott on CIO lumber in the San Francisco region was lifted."

A resolution signed by Henry Schmidt, president, said the boycott action would be accomplished by calling a "conference of delegates from other maritime unions" to consider the advisability of "refusing to transport or load or unload any AFL lumber in retaliation against the boycott instituted by William Hutcheson, president of the Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners."

The Portland branch, Sailors' Union of the Pacific, previously voted to stay out of the AFL-CIO struggle for control of sawmill workers.

The Supercargoes and Checkers' union, No. 38-784, which accepted a CIO charter after 45 members voted in December, reversed the action last night and voted, 115 to 24, to retain affiliation with the International Longshoremen's association and the AFL.

The union shelved the CIO charter previously and ordered the referendum.

EXPANSION OF FARM YOUTH AID IS URGED

WASHINGTON, March 10.—(AP)—M. L. Wilson, undersecretary of agriculture, urged expansion today of federal assistance programs for the 6,871,000 youngsters 15 to 25 years old on American farms.

Testifying before the senate unemployment and relief committee, Wilson said the vocational education and agricultural extension service were doing "exceptionally fine work" but that lack of funds prevented them from reaching all eligible.

"Small loans, accompanied by skillful supervision can help tens of thousands of youthful farmers to get a start toward success in agriculture," he declared.

Wilson said the depression had reversed migration trends and that for the first time in recent history more people were going from cities to farms than from farms to the cities.

He estimated the farm youth population would reach 7,176,000 by 1940.

SNOW, RAIN HIT EASTERN STATES

Snow and rain, driven by strong winds, swept over the entire eastern half of the United States today in a renewal of wintry weather.

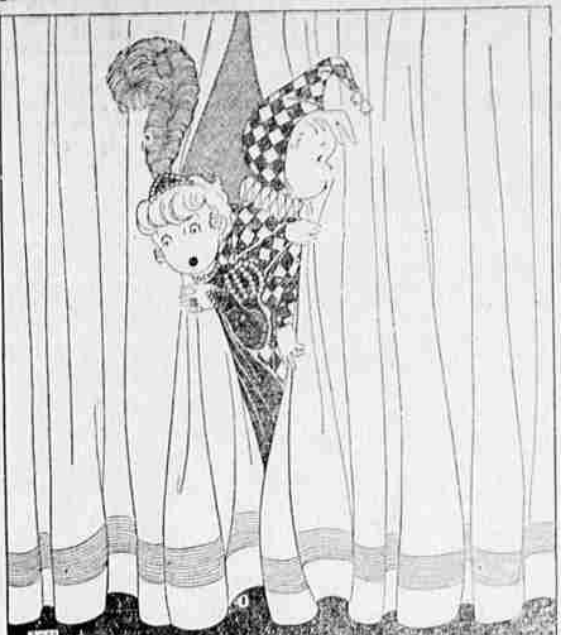
Although spring weather prevailed in Florida and the southwest and the sun shone over most of the west with the exception of California, the most densely populated part of the east experienced winter.

STORMS FAIL TO HIT CALIFORNIA

LOS ANGELES, March 10.—(AP)—Additional respite from an anticipated second storm was granted southern California today as rehabilitation work moved ahead in flood-marred areas.

While Meteorologist L. H. Daingerfield forecast unsettled conditions tonight and Friday with occasional rain, he added the flood-battered southland might not get any rain.

"If this high pressure which has developed west of the Rockies should hold indefinitely," he said, "we might not get any rain at all."

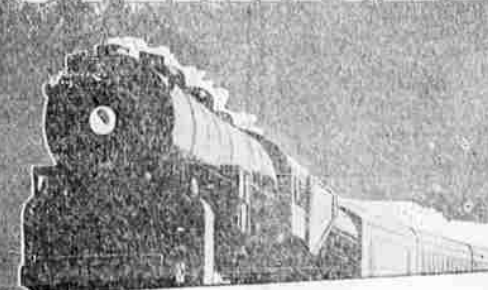
