NEW YORK—Budget clothes never have been more alluring. It's a season when every girl can look smart and trim on what she has to spend—be it ever so little!

A three-piece suit in one of the better budget shops costs less than forty dollars, includes a skirt, beautifully cut jacket and a full-length coat. Since the coat is perfect over silk dresses, the skirt designed to look well with sweaters (for country week-ends) and both jacket and skirt sure to be wearable next fall and all next winter what better value could be found for the same money?

This three-piece, a good set of accessories, a print dress and a dark sheer one would see any woman through spring and summer.

The trick, of course, would be to select accessories to go nicely with the silk dresses as well as with the suit. As a matter of fact, in any sort of budget plan for a smart wardrobe, intelligent selection of accessories always is the trick.

A lovely shirtwaist frock that comes in a variety of colors and silk fabrics is priced at less than twenty dollars. And when you
