LADIES' AID MEETING IS HELD THURSDAY

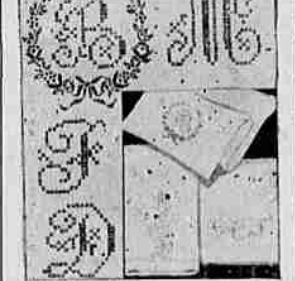
