In the cabinet are seen the trophy won in 1935 by the boys who took second place in indoor baseball in the Douglas county "B" league; a cup won by the school for county typing accuracy contest; the C. J. Miceli award, a cup which is the property of the school the result of winning it three years in succession, 1931, 1932 and 1933. This cup bears the names of Hazel Belcher and Margaret Stevenson, 1931; Virginia Belcher, Gene Pickett, 1932, and Lewis Jantzer and Vida Huffstader, for 1933.

There are two plaques inscribed with the names of seniors judged the best all around students, based on scholarship, loyalty and achievement. On the plaque for 1929 is the name of J. Renfrew Stevenson; 1930, Francis Nelson; 1931, Lester Windes; 1932, Modene McCollum; 1933, Berniece Martin; 1934, Virginia Belcher; on the second plaque for 1936, Elleen Peil and Robert Windes; 1937, Bill Belcher and Adrian Wigley. The graduating class of 1935 purchased the cabinet and presented it to the school.

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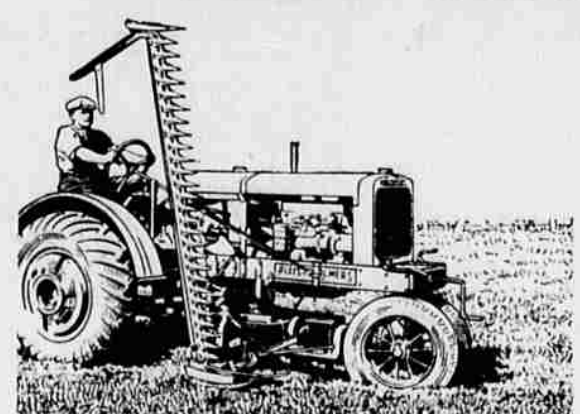


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
